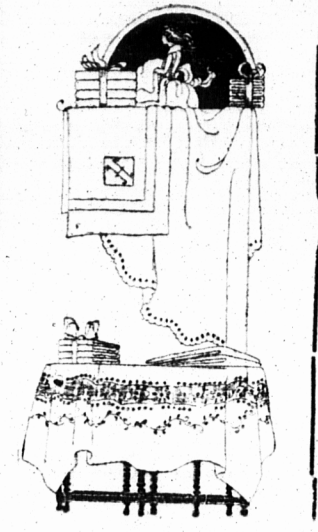

**JOHANNESBURG, March 11.**—The government, determined to end the present situation created by the gold miners' strike, today issued a proclamation ordering the mobilized artillery, imperial light forces, a field unit, in which horse and other units to reinforce the police here. This police also was warned that airplanes will be used if necessary. At Germiston last night a band of natives, armed with various kinds of weapons, yesterday took a hand in the strike situation when they dispersed a band of extreme natives, including police, who were wounded.
