

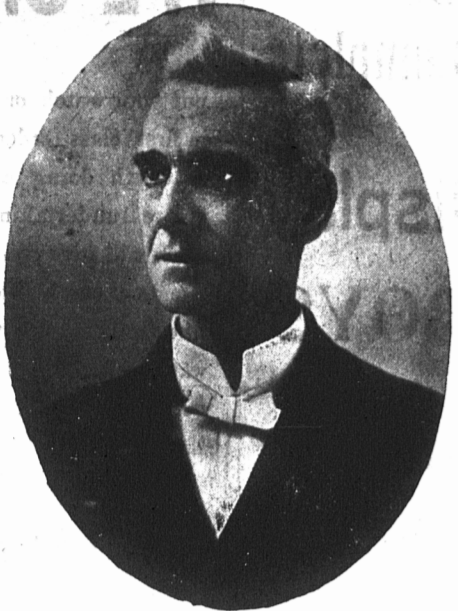

ANGLO-FRENCH AGREEMENT MADE

The Terms—Britain Pays a Two-Fold Indemnity

Premier Bond Speaks Upon the Treaty—He Says that Ratification Depends Upon Nfld Government.

PREMIER BOND SPEAKS.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld April 8.—(Special)—Interrogated in the legislature Premier Bond said that the Newfoundland Government was the consenting party to the negotiations on French shore question.

GOVERNMENT MADE SUGGESTIONS.

The Government had made suggestions as to the conditions of the arrangements and had pledged its acquiescence of its proposals when they were adopted.

NEWFOUNDLAND TO CONSENT.

If the agreement was conducted by the high contracting parties it would be subject to the approval of the Newfoundland Government.

THE AGREEMENT SIGNED.

PARIS, April 8.—(Special)—The Associated Press learns from London that the Anglo-French colonial treaty including the agreement relative to Morocco and Egypt and Newfoundland has been signed.

THE TERMS ARRANGED.

By its terms France surrenders the sovereignty over the Newfoundland shore and receives in return a two fold indemnity.

A TWO FOLD INDEMNITY.

The first is for the French individuals who are giving up their property along the surrendered shore. The second is for the French Government's relinquishment of its sovereignty over the territory.

CANADIANS FOR JAPANESE CORPS

Those in South African Service to be Preferred

Arrangement for Saw-Off in British Columbia—Conditions for Arrangement—Want Resignation of Member.

TO ARRANGE A SAW-OFF.

TORONTO, April 8.—(Special)—The Globe special from Victoria, B. C., says it is

proposed to arrange a saw-off of election petitions pending in the courts against the returns of members in the Provincial Legislature.

MADE ONLY ON CONDITION.

The Government party seemed willing but the Opposition are not willing. An arrangement can now only be made on the assurance of the resignation of the member for Ka-loops.

APPLICATION TO CANADIANS.

MONTREAL, April 8.—(Special)—It is stated here that the Secret Service Agency, acting on behalf of the Japanese Bearer Corps, has been applying for service to Canadians in the Russia-Japanese war. Those who saw service in South Africa are to be given the preference.
