The special preacher was Dr. Simpson, whose sermon, based on a phrase from Hebrews 12-15 "By means of death," dealt with the meaning of the acceptance of the gift of death frees man from fear, and enables him to transcend the changes and chances of this life.

He recalled the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary in 1919 of the death of the Rev. Dr. Hunt and his father Canon Simpson, Rev. W. J. Cox and Mr. L. W. Watson, all of whom have since been called by death.

He stressed the fact that for the past fifty years the Daily Eucharist had been the centre of the devotional life of St. Peter's. It was the privilege and responsibility to build upon the foundations which had been so well laid.

The singing of the hymn "Ye Watchers and Ye Holy Ones" towards the close of this service a Procession was made from the Altar around the Church. It was led by the organ, Harry Gham, vested in a girded alb. The boys, women and men of the choir followed with two banner bearers, carrying a banner of the Holy Spirit.

On the return of the Procession to the altar a solemn Te Deum of Thanksgiving was sung to the setting by Evelyn and followed by appropriate verses and prayers. This service of praise was brought to a close by the Bishop's Benediction.

Mr. Walter MacNutt was organist and choir director.

Reception Held

After the service, members of the Church English and other Sisters were invited to a reception in the Parish Hall to meet His Lordship the Bishop. Refreshments were served by the ladies of St. Peter's. The chief service of the Festival will be the Choral Eucharist today (St. Peter's) when the celebrant will be the Incumbent, assisted by Archdeacon Harrison and Deacon and Rural Dean Davies as well as the organist and choir.

The Rev. Dr. Simpson will act as master of ceremonies.

The music of the Eucharist will be the Missa Angeli, with Mr. Walter MacNutt at the organ.

In their thrust across the Oder River, the tomnies engaged Muench, Grahden, Sur, and Manderscheid, Tourville and Colleville and mopped up the Germans in a preliminary battle just south of Tessel-Bretteville.

Immediately north of Oden, there was heavy fighting, and it was said that considerable improvisation would be required to get the fullest advantage from the port. A salvage fleet under expert hands was less than two weeks work.

Reductions in Tariff on Farm Implements

OTTAWA, June 27 - Practically the only country from which agricultural implements are imported into Canada is the United States. The tariff reductions announced in Finance Minister Isley's budget speech affect some 70 types of implements and equipment and spare parts on which present duties range from five to 25 per cent.

A duty of five per cent on imports from the United States, or any other most-favored-nation country, on articles which enter into the cost of manufacture of almost all agricultural implements and machinery in the list affected has been eliminated when imports are for manufacture of articles of that type.

A duty of \$1 a ton on pig iron and 25¢ a ton on iron or steel rods or bars used in the manufacture of agricultural implements also has been eliminated when imports are for manufacture of articles of that type.

Provision also has been made for duty free entry of articles which enter into the cost of manufacturing machinery used in the manufacture of agricultural implements.

Previously 1-2 per cent and now free:— Harvesting machines; reapers; harvester combines; plows; rollers; farm field, lawn or garden; soil packers; cultivators; harrows; seed-drills; horse-drawn; horse-drawn; manure spreaders; weedeaters; hay loaders; hay tedders; hay presses; potato planters; potato diggers; fodder for feed cutters; ensilage cutters; grain crushers; grain or hay grinders; post hole diggers; snaths; stumping machines.

Previously 1-2 per cent and now free:— Previously 1-2 per cent and now free:— milking machines; centrifugal machines for testing butterfat, milk or cream; certain equipment for farm lighting plants and complete parts of such machines.

Previously 15 per cent and now free:— portable engines with boilers for farm purposes; horse-powered; aluminum parts for egg-graders; complete parts such equipment.

Previously 26 per cent and now free:— grain loaders or elevators (capacity not more than 40 bushel per minute) complete parts.

Returns From C. W. L. Convention

Mrs. A. J. Howatt returned last night from the National Convention of the C.W.L., which opened on June 10 at London, Ont.

This was Mrs. Howatt's first National Convention and she definitely affirms that the money investment in sending a delegate to a national convention is a wise one. She found out how to live up to the motto of the League, "For God and Canada", for, in the many discussions reports and addresses which she took part in and listen too, her mind is broadened; she becomes more league minded and returns to her sub-division with more knowledge, initiative and courage to go forward and work for an organization which is all in all, Catholic, patriotic and democratic.

Many important phases of League work were formulated at the convention and the basic theme was the importance of the Christian family and the role of the mothers of the world. Mrs. Howatt especially now on the home front for perhaps more than anyone else can the wives, the mothers of the world, must sustain their men in the tremendous sacrifices necessary as a price of victory which ever we are going to win. The moral, the intellectual and the religious, if ever we are going to bring children through the dangerous period free from sin we must give them that knowledge and guidance. Children must be trained to say "no" in the face of temptation. Self-indulgence had companions, bad reading, bad shows and steady unsupervised company at the age of 15 were mentioned as pitfalls for young women.

Land ownership distribution was also urged by Catholic women especially in the conversion of tenures and finance; also, that the Government institute a system of rural education which by proper choice of subjects and methods will educate the boys and girls to develop good rural homes and better communities and encourage adult education. Rural electrification in order to lessen the burdens of the farming women was also mentioned. City women need to develop a more sympathetic attitude towards the rural women.

It was decided at this convention to print leaflets in French speaking or bilingual parishes in order to arouse more interest in G.W.L. work. Mrs. G. S. Marceau, from Quebec kindly offered to finance the printing.
