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CANADA'S CAPITAL WELCOMES SOVEREIGNS

BRITAIN MAKES GERMANY PEACE GESTURE

RENUNCIATION OF AGGRESSION INITIAL STEP

Berlin "Cold" Towards Proposal — Anglo - Russian Negotiations Proceed.

Prime Minister Chamberlain offered Friday to confer with Germany with a view to reaching a permanent peace if Germany would renounce aggressive aims in such a way as to convince Great Britain that she meant it.

In Berlin official circles said the statement contributed little of value to the "big picture" of European tension.

Official circles in Moscow took careful note of the speech but refrained from comment.

British Under-Secretary of Foreign Affairs, Richard Butler, told the House that an outright alliance with Russia and France involved such a "big departure in British policy" that the Government is approaching this matter with caution.

Violence lessened in Palestine where Jews launched a passive resistance campaign against the British Government's plan to create an independent state.

In Madrid General Franco held his "victory parade" and 127,000 Spanish troops marched through rain with 10,000 Italians, 8,000 Moors and 5,000 Germans.

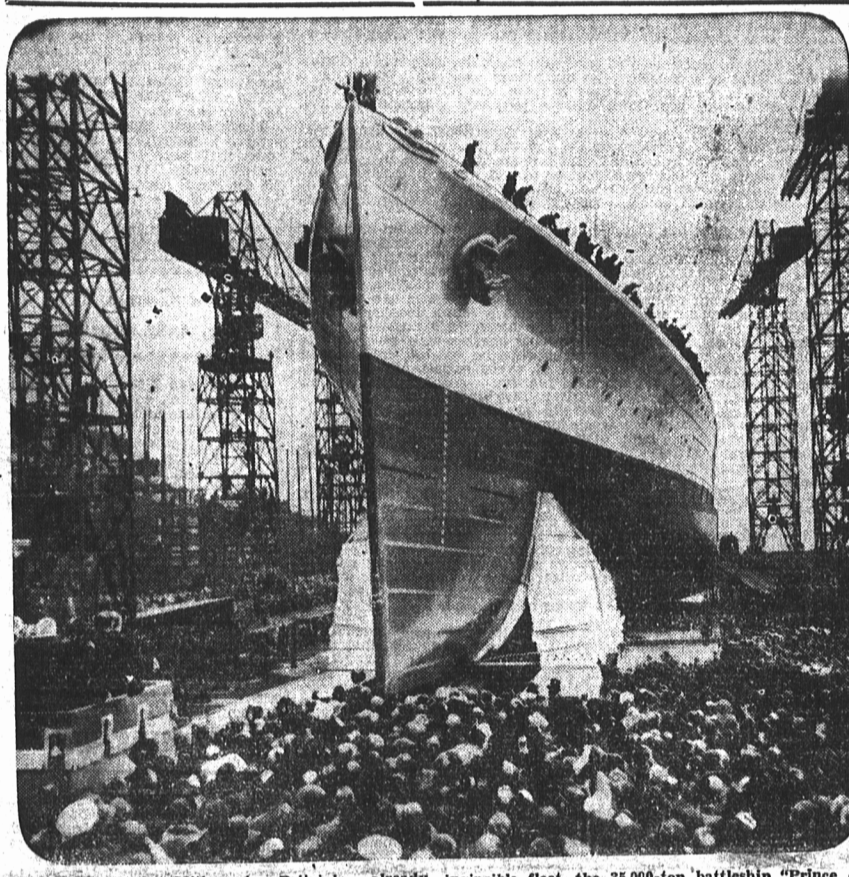
Baby Born As Royalty Passes

The newest addition to Britain's already invincible fleet, the 35,000-ton battleship "Prince of Wales" is shown being launched a few days ago at the River Mersey shipyards at Birkenhead, Eng. In the left foreground is the platform from which the Princess Royal, who christened the ship, and other notables watched the great war vessel take to the water. The "Prince of Wales" will, it is said, be one of the world's fastest warships with a speed of "more than 30 knots." She will mount 10 14-inch guns in three turrets, and 16 5.1-4 inch guns.

ROYAL ASSENT GIVEN ACTS BY THE KING

OTTAWA, May 19 — (CP)—George VI, on a red upholstered throne in His Majesty's Canadian Senate Chamber today, his gracious and lovely Queen by his side, gave royal assent to legislative acts passed by Parliament, and, before the members of the Senate and House of Commons assembled, prayed that "the blessings of divine Providence rest upon your labors, and upon my realm in Canada."

Age-Old Pageantry

It was the age-old pageantry which has accompanied the visit of the King or his representative to Parliament since Parliament began, but today it was clothed in almost indescribable beauty and wordless drama that wrote a new page in the history of Canada and of the Empire.

Electric Tension

Today there was an electric tension in the air, a feeling of unreality and an emotion that could only be created by the living presence of the heads of the Empire playing their parts with a simplicity and charm that brought tears to the eyes of many school children and of those who could not restrain exclamations of wonder and admiration.

Makes Speech

To the delight and surprise of the throng assembled within the chamber, His Majesty read, first in English and then in French a brief speech from the Throne, thus making further history. No speeches are delivered from the Throne except at the opening and closing of Parliament.

Finally, Their Majesties drove to the Parliament Buildings where the King gave royal assent to several bills in a historic ceremonial. Cabinet ministers in uniforms, judges in scarlet robes with ermine were grouped at the foot of the throne dais. Women were evening dress.

When the actual moment arrived, when the royal train moved slowly into the temporary station at Island Park Drive, Queen Elizabeth looked out from the lounge and waved her hand. A great cheer went up from the waiting throng.

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King And Queen Open Historic Visit To Ottawa

First Unpleasant Weather Of Royal Tour Fails To Mar Occasion — Cheering Crowds Roar Greetings.

OTTAWA, May 19—Regal ritual new to any British Dominion was uncovered today when King George and Queen Elizabeth, after receiving a tumultuous welcome in the streets, sat upon the Thrones of Canada.

For the first time in history a British Sovereign sat in the Senate of the Canadian Parliament. Arrayed about the King and Queen in the dignified Red Chamber were members of the Senate and House of Commons and their brilliantly-gowned wives, diplomats and those high up in the capital's order of precedence.

Outside were the thousands who came out to cheer Their Majesties on their arrival, on a long drive under threatening skies that occasionally threatened rain and again when the smiling Royal Couple drove from Government House to Parliament for the dramatic enthronement.
