Savagely Attacks a Three-Year-Old Child.

THE SISTER'S RESCUE

Terrible Wounds Inflicted in the Child's Face by the Animal's Teeth.

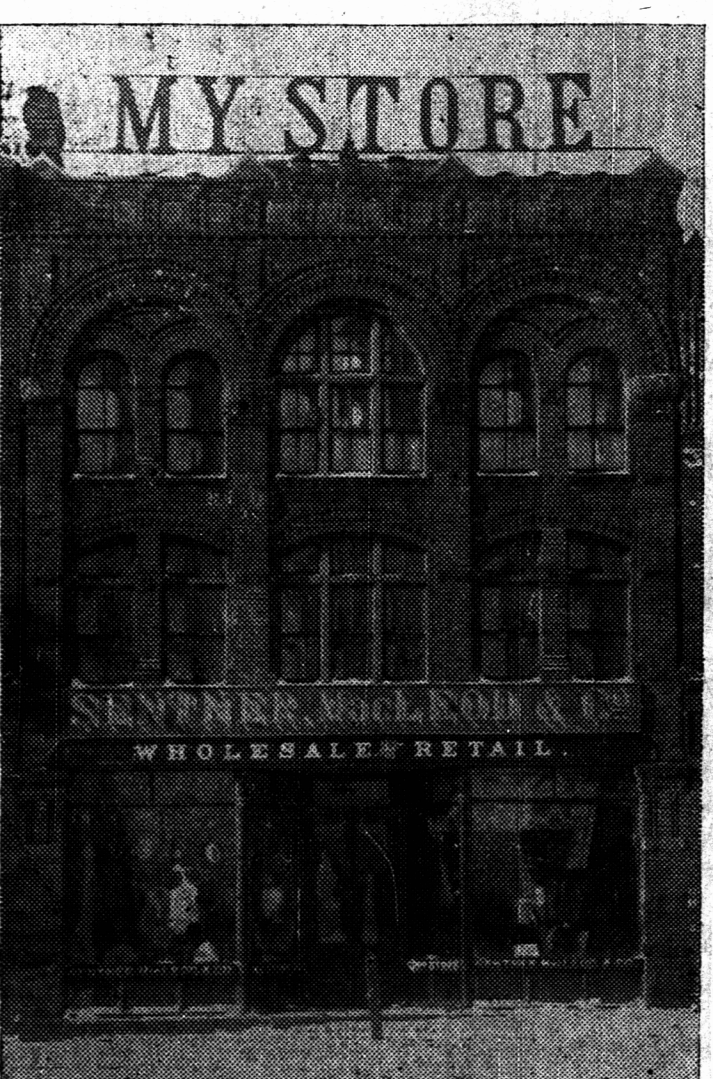
BAY FORTUNE, May 1st.—A shocking accident occurred on the evening of the 27th inst., to a little girl, three years old, belonging to Mr. Albert Burke of Bay Fortune. While the child was out in the yard playing their dog, a very large animal, attacked her fiercely inflicting deep wounds on the face. The eldest sister Minnie ran immediately to the rescue, and succeeded in getting the little one disengaged from her maddened foe. But again the dog grabbed the child and was deliberately proceeding with the work of death, when the sister again clutched her precious charge and ran to the nearest building. By this time the father arrived and captured the brute which he immediately killed.

Serious wounds were found on the child's face and forehead. The side of the face was so punctured by the dog's teeth as to leave the inside of the mouth exposed to view. Her recovery is expected however.
