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## 8TH BATTERY WIN CITY SOFTBALL TITLE

### Defeat Bakery Team 14-5 In Third Game To Advance To Maritime Playdowns

### Lawson Little Wins Canuck Open Title

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

TORONTO, Sept. 13.—Back on championship heights again, this time with the professionals as well as the amateurs looking up to him, game Lawson Little of San Francisco won the Canadian open golf crown tonight and surveyed his business surroundings with what he called "new confidence."

While a gallery of 10,000 behaved like a baseball crowd cheering and whistling after every good shot, Little stormed down the stretch yesterday at the St. Andrew's club to record his fourth consecutive 271, nine under par, for the 72-hole championship.

The Ontario Canadian, undisputed monarch of the amateurs when he made golf his business last spring, broke Leo Diegel's seven-year-old record of 274 with rounds of 67, 66, 69 and 69. He led a field of the best shotmakers in United States and Canada by eight strokes.

A dramatic challenge by Jimmy Thomson of Shawnee-on-Delaware, Pa., to overcome Lawson's early lead forced the big ex-amateur to uncover two sensational comebacks on the stretch and finish with a string of birdies that left the stampeding gallery cheering wildly. The scene at the finish was unprecedented in Canadian golf.

As Little tapped in a short putt for his final birdie, the crowd swarmed over the green and pounded the new champion on the back, grasped his hand and made as much noise as a hockey crowd could have mustered. It was Lawson's first triumph since turning professional.

The slugging Thompson, one of the longest hitters in the sport won second money of \$600 with a total score of 279, made up of rounds of 68, 75, 67, and 69. Little took \$1,000 prize money and the Seagram Gold Trophy, one of the most glittering and expensive cups in the golf world. He was its first winner.

Finishing Saturday with a pair of 69s Craig Wood of New York, winning of the General Brock Tournament at Pottsville, Ont., in June, took down third money of \$400 with a 282 total. Victor Czechi of Des Moines, Iowa, and the Veteran Diegel, four-time winner of the open, tied for fourth place of 283. Each collected \$250.

Fading after his record-breaking 65 round Friday, Paul Runyan of White Plains, N. Y., finished sixth with 284. Next came Al Watrous, of Birmingham, Mich., and Ed. Dudley of Bala, Pa., with 285.

### Giants Split Twin Bill With Second Place Cards

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—(A. P.)—Amid the tumult and the roar of the mightiest crowd ever to witness a National League baseball game, an overflow crowd of 64,417 that packed the Polo Grounds, the league-leading New York Giants split a spectacular doubleheader today with their foremost challengers, St. Louis Cardinals.

Rushing to the rescue of the faltering Roy Parmelee in the eighth inning of the final game, Dizzy Dean saved an even break for the "GasHouse Gang" after the Giants had pinned their ears back with an 8-4 victory in the opener, with the aid of two homers by Mel Ott.

Dean, pitching in his third game in two days, turned back the home team with the tying run on second base in each of the last two innings. His brilliant relief job protected a one run margin, clinched a 4-3 decision for the Cardinals that was due mainly to Johnny Mize's homer with two on, and kept alive what's left of the furious pennant battle.

Fighting hard for a double triumph that would have all but ended any lingering doubt about the championship outcome, the Giants nevertheless preserved their lead of 3 1-2 games over the Cardinals, with the last game of the series due tomorrow. Meanwhile Chicago Cubs, by dividing two games in Brooklyn, remained five behind in the race.

At Boston the Bees, with Danny MacFayden pitching six hit ball, defeated Cincinnati Reds 6-1 today after being no-hit 2-1 and limited to three hits by Gene Schott in the first game of a doubleheader. The winning run of the first game came in the eighth inning on singles by Hazen Cuyler, Les Scarcella and Ernie Lombardi.

Both teams scored one run in the opening inning of the second game, but MacFayden never was in danger after that. The Phillies and Pittsburgh Pirates divided a Philadelphia doubleheader, the Phillies taking the nightcap 4-3 after the Pirates won the opener 5-3.

The Phils staged a three-run rally in the seventh inning to knock Mace Brown out of the box and win the second game. In the first game the Pirates rallied against young Pete Sivers to score three runs in the sixth after a homer by Chuck Klein, his 23rd of the year, with a man on base, had tied the score in the sixth.

At Brooklyn Chicago Cubs blew a chance to gain on the National League leaders by getting only a split with the Dodgers in a doubleheader. The Dodgers got to Larry French for three runs in the opening inning of the first game to take lead they never gave up in winning a 6-3 decision. A five-run blast in the sixth inning clinched a 9-7 victory for the Cubs in the nightcap.

The Giants, at home, were completely throttled by the smoking curves of Lon Warneke Saturday and the third-place Chicago Cubs had little trouble blanking the league-leading New Yorkers 6-0 as 18,000 fans looked on.

Brooklyn Dodgers gave the Giants some support in the tight league race by defeating the second place Cardinals 9-8 in the first game of a doubleheader at Ebbets Field, but they dropped the nightcap 10-3 and St. Louis gained one-half game on the leaders.

In the games between the other teams merely battling for lower berths Philadelphia helped themselves to a twin-bill from Cincinnati by 7-1 and 7-2 Boston beat Pittsburgh 3-2.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—(A. P.)—Bob Feller, husky schoolboy rookie from Iowa, wound up under a dark sky at Cleveland today and blazed his fast one past Philadelphia Athletics to strike out 17 batters and allow only two hits, as Cleveland Indians won both games of a doubleheader.

That was one more strikeout than Rube Waddell achieved 28 years ago when he set the American League record which stood until today. It also put Feller's name beside that of Dizzy Dean as co-holder of the major league record.

### Draegermen Win Title

Jim Coyle's renowned Draegermen—the boys who can wuh-hoo—won the Holy Redeemer softball championship over the week-end when they defeated the Excelsiors 23-22.

Trailing 13-21, in their half of the ninth with two out, the new champions looked anything but winners. But hard slugging, nice base running, combined with the complete crack-up of the Excelsior team enabled ten Draegermen to cross the plate and give their team the margin of victory.

It was a great victory for the Coyle gang and a tough break on the Excelsiors, who up to the fatal ninth had the game well in hand. The series just completed was a lively one. Every game was keenly contested and productive of fine softball. Both the Draegermen and Excelsiors are to be commended on the splendid interest they took in the softball throughout the season. They always had their teams on hand and gave their best, with the result that interest in softball in the north end of the town increased a great deal.

### Alice Marble Dethrones Helen Jacobs

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 13.—(A.P.)—Achieving a great goal in his outstanding career, Fred Perry of England won the United States singles tennis title for the third time Saturday, the first invader ever to gain permanent possession of the championship trophy.

The Briton's triumph came after Alice Marble of San Francisco crowned her comeback campaign by dethroning Helen Jacobs as the women's titleholder, by scores of 4-6, 6-3, 6-2.

Perry, three-times winner of the All-England championship and backbone of the all-conquering British Davies Cup team the past four years, defeated California's 22-year-old red-headed Don Budge, 2-6, 6-2, 8-6, 1-6, 10-8 in a match that was played partly in rain and before a capacity audience of almost 14,000 spectators.

Miss Marble realized an ambition she seemed headed to achieve in 1934 when she was stricken ill during the French Hard Court Championships in Paris. The statuesque San Francisco blonde, who returned to competition this year, gave a vivid exhibition of tennis to end Miss Jacobs' hopes of becoming the first player to capture the championship five times in a row.

Perry, by his own words, was the "happiest man in the world" after he blazed over his last of 11 service aces for the winning point. By his own admission, it was the most difficult match of his colorful career. Budge's fine playing, the roisterous crowd and the weather conditions taken into consideration.

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
