NEW FORUM FOR MONCTON

MONCTON, N. B., July 3.—A motion accepting the plans and specifications for the new rink and exhibition building for the City of Moncton and authorizing the city clerk to call for tenders at once, the closing date before noon, July 21, was passed by the City Council sitting in committee of the whole tonight.

The plans and specifications, as submitted by Architect J. S. Roy, call for a building 160 ft. x 260 ft. with an ice surface of 88 ft. x 160 ft. and a seating capacity of approximately 5,000 with standing room for an additional 1,500 persons.

The motion moved by Alderman Brown and passed unanimously the tenders shall be accompanied by a cheque for 10 per cent of the total tender and shall read as follows: (a) A solid brick building; (b) concrete block with brick front; (c) concrete seats throughout; (d) wooden seats throughout.

The motion was made to read in this manner due to the fact that the figures submitted by the architect called for wooden seats and some of the members of the Council were of the opinion that the building should be entirely fire-proof and it was possible that this might be done by making the advertisement for tenders read as above.
