THE PATRIOT AND THE TELEPHONE BILL.

The esteemed Patriot shows extraordinary zeal in behalf of the Telephone Bill, a zeal which is so fervid that it seems calculated to increase existing prejudices and distrust and by so doing defeat the object which it has in view. Its line of argument is not in the public interest and cannot gain favor for the Company.

The Company at present has a monopoly of the telephone business in P. E. Island, with exemption from taxation, the free use of the streets and highways and a considerable yearly subsidy from the Government. Surely these are not unfavorable conditions. Moreover it is secure in the possession of all these things for four years to come. And the Guardian makes no objection. But why is it necessary to secure an extension at the present session of the Legislature? No sufficient reason has been put forward. The Patriot gives no sufficient reason.

The one attempt to furnish a reason is made by The Patriot on the ground that the Company propose to make certain improvements. These proposed improvements are necessary to the business which the Company has undertaken. If the capital of the Company were insufficient, which it is not, the reason furnished by The Patriot would be a good reason for asking power to increase the capital stock. No such need exists. The Company is well able to modernise its system and in duty bound to do so whether its contract is extended or not.

But when The Patriot goes further and intimates that if the Company does not now obtain an extension of its monopoly "it would naturally decline" to make the projected improvements, it creates a strong and damaging prejudice against the Company. In effect The Patriot says, Give an extension now—four years before the contract expires, or the Company will not improve the existing service. That would be equivalent to a "hold up" at the pistol's mouth. We are sure the Company will not take this ground. The Patriot's zeal must have outrun its discretion.

As we said yesterday, no public interest and no right or privilege of the company would be menaced or imperilled by holding over the Telephone Bill till another session. No sufficient or valid reason has been put forward to justify its passage now. If it has been agreed upon in secret caucus, for reasons that the public do not know of then so much the worse for the caucus and the members composing it.

We print this morning the full list of contributions toward paying off the mortgage debt on the Y. M. C. A. Building. How many in town and country did nobly for this worthy object! Never was the money of generous donors given for a better cause.

Dont forget the Japanese Famine Fund. One school, one Division of Sons of Temperance, one Church Sunday school and the Y. M. C. A. of this city have set the example to other organizations. We hope the example may be followed by scores of churches, schools, lodges and divisions. The need is great and time presses. It is hard to think of people starving while we live in abundance.

AUTO-CARS AND ROADS.

We are to have trolley cars and more automobiles in our midst before long. What will be the effect on the country roads? The New York Legislature the other day passed an Act imposing a state tax of \$2 on each motor vehicle weighing 500 pounds or less, with \$1 additional for each additional 500 pounds weight. This was vigorously opposed by those interested in running automobiles on the ground that such vehicles are road-makers and not road-breakers.

On the other side it was admitted that on a damp dirt road the auto helps to pack the materials and make a better road. But it was contended that on a macadamised road the section of the rubber tires draws out the fine particles of dirt, adds greatly to the quantity of dust, and in time removes all the material above the stone. This was alleged to be particularly true when these vehicles run at high speed. This view prevailed with the New York Legislature where they know more about autos than we do here. But we have very little macadamised road in this Province compared with the extent of earth roads.
