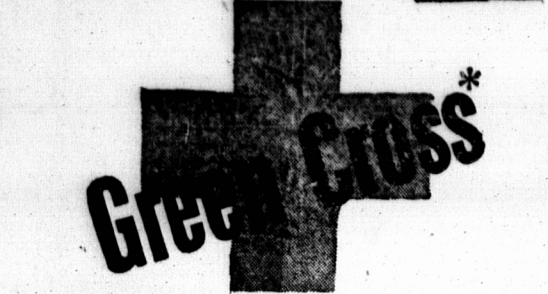

Talonique  
May 22, 1947  
Noble sir. You will be surprised undoubtedly to receive a letter from a stranger. But, dear sir, it was a very great joy when in the parcel that I received at the distribution to the poor by the church, I found your address. I was so touched that I cannot find words to express my thanks to you. Your interest in the poor families of Greece makes us very proud, you are worthy of all honor and all esteem.

The free country of America alone can have sympathizing people like you. You have helped a poor family which struggled for the safety of our great allies and the Greek race. For noble sir during an air attack on our city I lost my dear father. I was obliged then to give up my studies and work at dress making to help my widowed mother. I have besides a brother younger than myself who works unceasingly night and day to be able to get the necessities of this life, so hard. Happily the sacrifices of our great allies encourage us and help us.

I stop for fear of tiring you with my letter and beg you if this does not trouble you, to write us a few words. We wish very much to hear news of a country so distant and to know better the people who remembered us in the hardest and very unhappy times of our lives. I send you the compliments of my mother and brother.
