Mr. McEwen felt that the co-operative in Prince Edward Island were moving in the right direction by organizing a central marketing association. Mr. E. M. Gorman, Director of St. Dunstan's University, was also in attendance taking care of the entertainment for the evening by showing several films. Dr. Dewar was also present and outlined in a few words a health center plan and the help it would receive from the Government Health Plan. He asked for the help of the O'Leary Co-op. There was a very large attendance at this meeting. The financial report was given in the afternoon by Mr. J. G. Dennis, supervisor of Co-operatives; also secretary of the Co-op on January 31st, 1948, and amounted to \$470,968, or an increase of \$80,000.00 over the previous year. The assets of the association total \$74,903.90 and this year \$10,000.00 will be returned to the members.
