cars mixed freight.

Owing to some trouble with the
engine it was 1.25 when the mail
special, bringing 65 bags of mail,
arrived in the City yesterday.

E. B. Harnett, representing the
Hickey & Nicholson Tobacco Co.,

G. C. Warren of North River, is on

The coldest registered Sunday night
was two above zero and at nine o'clock
yesterday morning seven above. Toward
evening the temperature gradually fell
and at nine last night it was one degree
below zero.

One of the patrons of the Stanley
Bridge Dairying Co., who was among the
largest contributors of milk to the factory
last year was John McEwen, who, so the
Guardian is informed, contributed 86,000
pounds of milk.

The steamship Coban, well known in
this port, which is being repaired at
Halifax, will soon be able to leave the
dock, repairs being almost completed.
She will not leave Halifax for some time
however, as she is to be paired and
otherwise fitted up.

C. F. Fisher of Montreal and a son of
Rev. G. W. Fisher, who at one time was
pastor of the Methodist Church at Pownal,
presided at the organ of Grace Methodist
Church on Sunday evening with very
great acceptance. Mr. Fisher who is
here on business is visiting the home of

The regular monthly meeting of the
City School Board was held last night.
The teachers' reports showed the
enrolment for the past month to be 1030;
average attendance 925; percentage 87.5;
cases tardiness 270; truants 11; visits to
parents 171; notices 51; corporal punish-
ment 11; below average 85; requests to
leave school before closing 48. The
estimates for the school year were taken
up and discussed item by item. The total
is in the vicinity of \$13,248. The City
school boilers for the heating systems have
been tested by Andrew McNair, who has
certified that he has examined and tested
them with a hydrostatic pressure of 80
pounds and left them in safe working
order.

Capt. Crockett of the Moncton Victoria
has telegraphed President Lithgow, of the
M. P. A. A., Halifax not trying him that
Moncton has protested the game on
Thursday night at Fredericton an account
of which appeared in The Guardian, on
account of the Capitals playing Jimmy
Williams of this City and an unknown
