Route Lies Over Wide Streets In Alberta Capital

Gateway to Great Open Spaces of Northwest Territories, Edmonton Prepares Welcome for Royal Party.

ON THE ROYAL ROUTE VICTORIA, May 1—(CP)—A city of 80,000 population, described by many visitors as "a little bit of old England" will greet King George and Queen Elizabeth when they reach this most western point on their trans-Canada tour.

Victoria got its start in 1843 when the Hudson's Bay Company, foreseeing loss of its Fort Vancouver on the Columbia River by establishment of the British-United States boundary farther north, founded Fort Victoria. Six years later the crown colony of Vancouver Island was created.

The Fraser River port of New Westminster, named by Queen Victoria and known as British Columbia's "Royal City" ever since, will be host briefly to King George and Queen Elizabeth. The city's greeting will be a symbol of the close association which has existed always between the one-time United Kingdom capital and the British Columbia capital.
