Will Likely Discuss Exchange Situation

OTTAWA, June 7—Conversations which President Truman and Prime Minister Mackenzie King will have during the President's visit to Canada next week are expected to cover most questions of mutual interest to the two countries including the delicate exchange situation.

The heavy balance of trade in favor of United States is believed to be rapidly depleting Canada's reserve of United States dollars and the conversations may include proposals to meet that problem.

It is being suggested here that some plan might be evolved similar to the Hyde Park agreement during the war. At that time, with Canada desperately short of American dollars, it was arranged during a visit of Mr. Mackenzie King to President Roosevelt that United States would buy with American funds war material from Canada for her own use and also for her lease-lend operations with the Allies.

This step solved the exchange situation at the time because Canada was able to deliver so much war and other material that she obtained not only sufficient American funds for all the purchases she needed to make in United States but to pile up substantial reserves.

Canada, being United States' best cash customer, the American Government is expected to lend a kindly ear to any suggestion that would save this country from being forced to curtail her purchases from her neighbors because of lack of American dollars.

Former P. E. I. Man Honored At Federal Capital

OTTAWA, June 6—(Special)—James A. Rodd, I.S.P., a native of Charlottetown who for the past thirty years has been director of Fish Culture in the Department of Fisheries here was honored today by Fisheries Minister H. F. G. Bridges and officials of the Department from Maritime and Western points on the occasion of his retirement from the Department after 45 years of service.

Minister's Tribute

Mr. Bridges in presenting Mr. Rodd with a handsome desk and chair together with an illuminated address of appreciation commended that just when he was getting the Department going smoothly a number of its key members were retiring on superannuation. He spoke of the very great contribution made by Mr. Rodd to fish culture in North America.

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Communist Campaign Feared In Full Swing

LONDON, June 6—(AP)—A new Balkan ferment, stirred by the Hungarian coup and highlighted by the arrest of the chief opposition leader in Bulgaria, roused fears among diplomats here today that a Communist campaign was in full swing to consolidate control in southeastern Europe in direct answer to President Truman's doctrine.

Political police were on the march in Budapest, where an Associated Press dispatch reported the Hungarian people live "in days and nights of suppressed terror," again listening to forbidden radio broadcasts. Vienna dispatches said the Hungarian border guard had been increased by thousands to prevent the escape of refugees.

Speculation on more Communist moves to strengthen their position before Soviet occupation troops are obliged by the peace treaties to withdraw from former Axis-satellite countries was aroused by the departure of Premier Petru Groza of Romania and a group of party leaders for Yugoslavia and Bulgaria.

Solemn Observance Of Corpus Christi Feast On Sunday

The solemnity of Corpus Christi will be observed by the congregations of St. Dunstan's Basilica and Holy Redeemer parishes tomorrow with the customary procession of the Blessed Sacrament to Notre Dame Academy where a richly decorated altar has been erected on the verandah facing Hillsborough Square and where Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament will be given by His Excellency Bishop Boyle.

Solemn Mass will be celebrated in the Basilica at 10 o'clock after which the parishioners of both parishes will form the procession which will proceed by way of Great George, Richmond, Weymouth and Sydney to Notre Dame Academy.

After Benediction the procession will return to the Basilica by way of Sydney, Hillsborough, Water and Great George Streets to the Basilica where Pontifical Benediction will be given.

Spring Planting Is Delayed In New Brunswick

SAINT JOHN, N.B., June 6—(CP)—Lack of fine weather and shortage of help have seriously delayed spring planting in New Brunswick, Agriculture Minister A. C. Taylor said today. Unless a dry, warm period occurred soon it would be too late to finish the job.

He said the weather situation was general throughout the province and it had been almost impossible to work the land during the past two weeks. Less than 50 per cent of seeding had been done and only favorable weather would assure good crops.

Conclusion of lumbering operations is expected to make more men available for farming but J. K. King, deputy minister of Agriculture, said many farmers reported the labor problem as difficult as ever.

Is Named Archbishop Of Quebec

OTTAWA, June 6—(CP)—Most Rev. Ildebrando Antonutti, Apostolic delegate to Canada and Newfoundland, announced tonight appointment by the Pope of Most Rev. Maurice Roy, bishop of Three Rivers, as Archbishop of Quebec. Archbishop Roy succeeds the late Rodrigue Cardinal Villeneuve.

At 42, Archbishop Roy becomes one of the youngest Roman Catholic Archbishops in the world. A veteran of the second World War, he served as chaplain for five years in England, Italy, France, Belgium and Holland.

The new archbishop was born at Quebec, where he received his early education. After taking his doctor of divinity degree at Laval University he was ordained a priest in June, 1927. He later spent two years in training at the Vatican.

Archbishop Roy was appointed Bishop of Three Rivers in January, 1946, and was consecrated the following May by Cardinal Villeneuve. The announcement, made by Pope Pius XII through his apostolic delegate to Canada, brought to an end speculation as to who would succeed Cardinal Villeneuve at the head of North America's oldest Catholic see.

Fire Ravages Settlement At Three Rivers

S. JOHN'S, Nfld., June 6—Starvation tonight faced the 154 inhabitants of Three Rapids, Labrador, as a food-laden mercy plane scheduled to take off today for the tiny settlement in the desolate wilderness remained grounded by bad weather.

Food supplies at the hamlet, 87 miles inland from the coastal village of Hopeville, were destroyed three weeks ago by a forest fire which advanced to the fringes of Three Rapids and levelled the food depot. The settlement's sole "means" of communication with the "outside," a radio station, also was gutted by the blaze.

The mercy plane, an American coast guard PBY flying boat carrying 800 pounds of food, was scheduled to take off today from the United States air and naval base at Argentia, 80 miles southwest of here. But poor flying conditions forced cancellation of the flight. Authorities said it would be attempted tomorrow at 7.30 A.M. if weather permitted.

Improved visibility and light winds were forecast for Newfoundland tomorrow morning and it appeared likely that the aircraft would be able to start on its mercy mission. It is about 450 air miles from Argentia to Three Rapids.

Goose Bay Not Attempted
Officials said a rescue mission had not been attempted from Goose Bay, Labrador, some 150 miles south of Three Rapids, because there were not sufficient supplies on hand at the air base there.

At the same time, a schooner chartered by Grieve Brothers owners of the lumber mill at Three Rapids, which was being loaded here, the vessel probably will leave tomorrow but it would take several days for it to reach the starving settlement. The Shipikan River, water approach to the Labrador community, still was ice-choked.

With radio communications cut off and water lanes blocked, first news of the grim plight of Three Rapids came out of the bleak Labrador hinterland yesterday.

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Whitehall Under Closer Scotland Yard Security

Churchill And Attlee Among Latest Targets Of "Bomb Letter" Terrorists.

LONDON, June 6—Scotland Yard retained a tight, rigid, security grip on Whitehall tonight, warding off "murder-by-mail" missives, nine more of which were intercepted at the general post office early today.

Prime Minister Attlee and Opposition leader Winston Churchill were among the targets of the "bomb letters."

Believed to have been dispatched by terrorists of the Jewish Stern gang, today's letters bring the total entering the country from abroad to 20.

At Buckingham Palace and other royal households, together with foreign embassies, offices and homes of cabinet members and other top-ranking public figures, "the greatest precautionary measures" were being taken. At ports and airports close watch on incoming mail was kept last new letters slipped in.

All 20 letters known to have been received so far bore Italian postmarks and several members of the Yard's special branch hastened by air to Rome.

The London press named Attlee and Churchill as among the targets and said others included the Deputy Prime Minister, Herbert Morrison, Fuel Minister Shinwell, Home Secretary Clutter Ede, who has general charge of Scotland Yard, and Health Minister Bevan.

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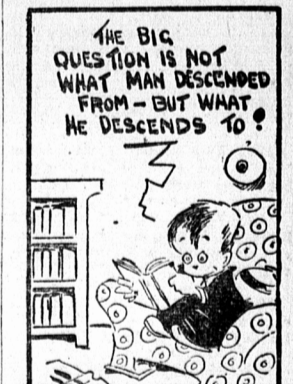
