Tartan Exported As Scots Yearn "For Ain Plaid"

EDINBURG, Jan. 3 — (CP) — Tartan is making a comeback with its air folk, stay the tartan manufacturers.

Tartan's top-line importance as a dollar-earner has fired Scots hearts "with a yearning" for their ain plaid" after years of a death of the wearin' o' the kilt.

"And," groan the mill-owners, "we can already export three times our output without coping with the increased demand on the home markets."

So the Scots go on waiting lists to get their plaid.

In Inverness alone, the demand for kilts is 50 per cent greater than last year. This is due somewhat to the increasing popularity of Scottish country dancing.

Kilts are still the front demand, but skirts are a good runner-up. Coats and dresses have something of a demand, but the hidebound Scots traditions "are aye agin they new fangled tartan ideas."

Tartan suits and men's tartan dinner jackets just haven't a look-in as far as the Scots are concerned. They are bought mostly by tourists or by the English market.

Kilt prices vary with the districts. Inverness: £10 (£\$1) to £16. 16s. for a man's kilt. Aberdeen: £8 to 18 guineas. Glasgow: £12. 10s. for a man's kilt and £10. 10s. for a lady's, 8 to 9 guineas for women.

The highest priced kilts are the dress kilts. Those are made of light worsted tartan and are the correct formal Highland dress.

Utility kilts are allowable by the Board of Trade, but are not plentiful or popular. They are confined to one or two clans: Fraser, Stewart MacKenzie and Cameron.

For those who have no clan tartan, the most popular is the Royal Stewart—the King's tartan. This is closely followed in popularity by the Cameron, dress Stuart and Buchanan.

Aberdeen and the northeastern of Scotland favors Gordon, Grant, Forbes and Anderson tartans.

New Jet Plane Makes Appearance

TORONTO, Dec. 31 — (CP) — One of the world's newest and most powerful jet fighters, the Avro CF-100 made its first public appearance today in taxiing tests at nearby Malton where it was built.

The 16-ton plane is larger than most jet fighters and is powered by two of the still-secret Rolls-Royce Avon engines with a total of 20,000 horsepower. The ship is expected to exceed 600 miles an hour.

The sleek craft was taxied along the runway by Squadron Leader Bill Waterton of Edmonton. It will undergo many hours of intense tests before it is flown.

The plane is designed to be equipped with extensive radar devices for all-weather and long-range night flying and will carry a two-man crew.
