LOCAL BRIEFS

THE mail express arrived on time
last evening.

if so a rare treat is in store for the citi-
zens of Charlottetown.

THE Brantford, Ont., Courier, of the
17th inst., says: Carl Creelman, the
Truro, N. S., bicycle rider, who has
been here several days en route for a
trip round the world, left this morning
for the West. Creelman got what he
was hankering after ever since he
struck town, viz., a Red Bird bicycle
to continue his trip upon. He got as
far as Brantford on another wheel, and
broke down, but he now hopes to circle
the globe without any further trouble.

THE market yesterday was fairly at-
tended. There was a large amount of
dairy butter which was quoted at 16-17
cents per pound. The egg supply con-
tinues short, there being only enough to
supply the local demand. Eggs were
selling at 12-13 cents per doz. Poultry
is beginning to come in and chickens
sold for 45 to 50 cts per pair. Old pota-
toes are still to be had in large quan-
tities and are selling from 20 to 25 cts
a bushel. New vegetables of various
kinds are beginning to find their way
into market, namely cauliflower,
cabbage, green peas and celery. Goose
berries and black currants were also
to be had at 4-6 cts and 10 cts per quart
respectively.

THE GUARDIAN had a pleasant call
yesterday from Mr. Duncan Marshall
of Toronto, well-known to the people
of P. E. Island in times past as the edi-
tor and manager of the Patron news-
paper. Mr. Marshall's many friends in
this section of the Dominion will be
pleased to learn that he is in excellent
health and spirits and as devoted to the
cause of moral reform as when he re-
sided here. On leaving the Island some
years ago Mr. Marshall took a position
on the Toronto Daily World, and later
on the Daily News of the same city.
When the plebiscite campaign came on
he left journalistic work to organize
the great Province of Ontario in the in-
terest of prohibition, being employed
by the Dominion Alliance. That ar-
duous task he most successfully accom-
plished. He was hereafter elected
Grand Secretary of the Good Templars
of Ontario, to which position he was
re-elected this year. In addition to the
duties of this responsible office Mr.
Marshall has charge of the advertising
department of the widely circulated
Weekly Sun. He is still an earnest be-
liever in the Patron platform and on
July 1st addressed an assembly of
2000 members of that body in Simcoe,
