**DISARMAMENT PROPOSAL IS REJECTED BY JAPAN**

GENEVA, May 20.—Japan's reply to the League of Nations disarmament questionnaire, which has just been received here, constitutes a definite rejection of the League's suggestion that each member states agree to limit its military and naval expenditures for the next two years to the total fixed in its budget for the current years. The Japanese Government considered the time is not yet ripe for applying this proposal, but expresses its approval of the principle involved.

Tokio's attitude is the natural sequel to Viscount Hayashi's pronouncements on the subject of disarmament in the League Assembly last December. Almost without exception the smaller nations belonging to the League have accepted the disarmament proposal.
