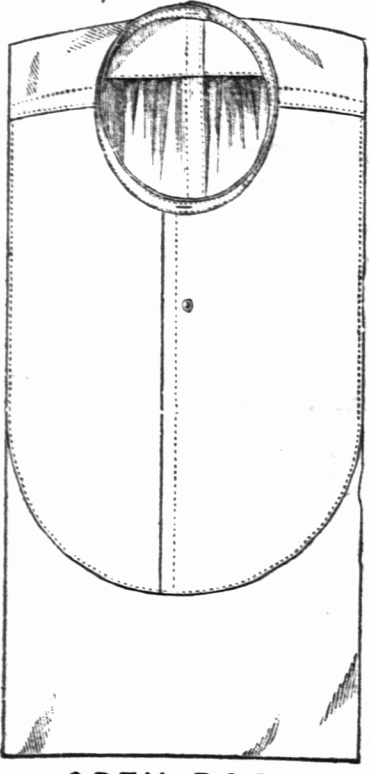

And during his illness, several open air meetings were held outside his house, which greatly cheered him, and which he highly appreciated. 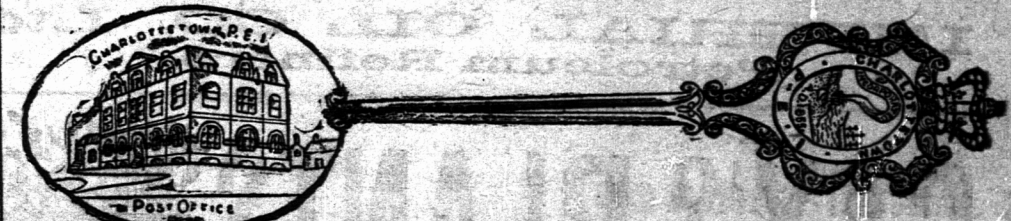
