To the Prince Edward Island Public:

Together with the other Dominion Representatives I have been asked by Sir Thomas White to explain the New Victory Loan to our people and say why they should subscribe to the utmost extent.

First, the Victory Loan is the best investment ever offered the Canadian public. It is a case where the public are given an opportunity giving their money for Public Service and yet actually retaining it for use in their own business—that is to say, the same amount of money or more can be raised on the security of the Bonds as is needed by the lender.

Another advantage which this security has over any other and which makes this investment preeminently desirable is the fact that the lender avoids taxation on the revenue which his money yields. The Government has gone, in my judgment, out of its way to grant this exemption from Taxation—the Bonds were good enough before—they are ten times more valuable as an investment with this Tax Exemption Clause.

In short in so far as an investment of your money in these Bonds is concerned there is absolutely no way you can use your cash to such immense advantage. Even if the investment was not any better than an ordinary one the people owe it to themselves and to the country to put every dollar they can rake and scrape up into this Loan.

The Government is spending large sums of money for the Province in giving us transportation facilities, and the more the people contribute to this loan the more readily and generously will the government treat us. I have no doubt about this matter.

These huge sums were spent in Canada by the Allies.

Canada's own war expenditure for the fiscal year 1918 was \$342,762,000.
