The large concourse of people which followed her remains to her last resting place, at St. Mark's Church of England, Rustico, testified the high esteem in which she was held. Much sympathy is felt for sorrow stricken husband and family who mourn the loss of a loving wife and mother.

Word of the death of John A. Martin in Portland (Ore.), came to friends in St. John Tuesday by telegraph. Mr. Martin died suddenly. He was a native of Prince Edward Island, and was about sixty years of age. He occupied a prominent place in Portland, being an extensive lumber merchant, and having formerly been an alderman. His wife is a daughter of David Stephenson, formerly of St. John, and now of Portland. Last year, Mr. and Mrs. Martin and their daughter visited St. John.

The Daily Columbian, a newspaper published at New Westminster, B.C., says. This evening, in the spacious diningroom of the Hotel Russell, Aid. E. J. Now, to use his own words, he has "the gem of the lot," the Hotel Russell of New Westminster. While Mr. Brine will bring to the management of the Russell rich experience in the hotel business, C. G. McLean will furnish mature judgment in commercial affairs gained in another school. Like his partner, he is a Charlottetown boy, and to continue the likeness further he is also an ardent supporter of all the games and sports that go to make manly men. For some years he was connected with the Bank of Nova Scotia and in Calgary he occupied the post of teller in that institution. Some months ago he severed his connection with the bank and went into the real estate and insurance business on his own account in Calgary, leaving that line to join his present partner in a ten-year lease of the Russell.

Yesterday was Prohibition day at the City Police Court. The first case as against Byrne Bros. vendors for neglecting to keep a proper register as required by statute a fine of \$20 and costs was imposed. John Hughes (Capt.) was convicted of a first offence and fined one hundred dollars and costs or three months in jail he paid his fine. Georgiana Hughes, was also convicted of a first offence against the Prohibition act and fined one hundred dollars and costs or three months in jail. Mr. Hughes paid this fine also.

A most interesting event took place at York, Wednesday evening at the home of Robert and Mrs. Vesey, the occasion being the celebration of the 50th anniversary of their marriage. The presents were numerous and costly, thus evidencing the esteem in which they are held in the community. Very appropriate addresses were given by Rev. G. F. Dawson, Benj. Gill and George Vesey, who was present at Mr. Vesey's marriage fifty years ago. The musical part of the program was under the direction of Mrs. West, who presided at the organ. It is needless to say that all were delighted with the evening's entertainment.

Death gathered home on Friday, 3rd inst. a very old, well known and highly esteemed resident of Donaldson in the person of Thomas Bell, Mr. Bell was born at Portage, Lot 35, in 1817 and had therefore reached the venerable age of ninety-one years. Notwithstanding his extreme age he had been quite well and active until a few days before his death, when he was stricken down by internal inflammation and despite medical attendance and the faithful ministrations of his two daughters he grew gradually worse and at an early hour on Friday morning he passed peacefully away, sustained by the Christian's hope. The deceased spent the whole of his long life in Donaldson. Though advanced in years he kept in close touch with everything going on in the world about him. quiet, intelligent, companionable old man, honored and respected by everyone and loved by a large circle of relatives and friends, he will now no more be seen. Two daughters, Miss Jane, and Eliza, wife of James Affleck, Donaldson, are left to cherish his memory. The funeral on Sunday afternoon to the Methodist Cemetery at Donaldson was one of the largest seen hereabouts for a long time. Rev. Mr. Wasson, Mt. Stewart, officiated at the house and grave, delivering a very impressive and sympathetic address at the house. The pall bearers were: John A. MacAulay, Joseph Dover, Frederick Webster, J. P. Dougan, Joseph MacAulay and Alex. McKinnon.

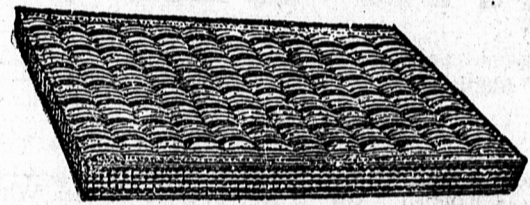

The results of the third year Medical Jurisprudence examination at McGill have announced. Island students have made an excellent showing, F. W. Auld, Covehead, leading his class, while J. J. There is renewed interest in the operations of the cow testing associations this year, and an evident determination on the part of hundreds of farmers to make sure of what each cow is doing in the way of milk production. This is the initial step in building up a good herd, for unless each cow attains a reasonable standard of production she should not be retained in the herd. There is no other method of knowing this except by weighing and testing systematically. The Cow Testing Association are intended to facilitate such work. In over fifty districts arrangements have already been made with the local maker at the cheese factory or creamery to do the testing once a month, so that there is no cost to the patrons beyond a trifling sum for sample bottles and scales. It is not too late during month to get started. Two or three good men in any locality could get together, arrange with the maker to do the testing and order the necessary scales and bottles. Write to the Dairy and Cold Storage Commissioner, Ottawa, for milk record sheets which are supplied free.
