Next summer he will superintend the building of a ranch for the company.

ACCIDENTAL DEATH. — From Silvertown, B. C., has come the sad news by telegraph of the death of Mr. Ronald McAulay, son of Mr. Angus C. McAulay of Tracadie Cross. He passed away only about 25 years of age and left the island about seven years ago for British Columbia.
