### IN MEMORIAM

MRS. ALFRED MAYHEW  
It becomes our painful duty to record the death of one of Margate's most highly respected and esteemed citizens in the person of Mrs. Alfred Mayhew at the age of 74 years.

Although she had not been in good health for some months previous, the news of her death came as a severe shock to her relatives and friends. She passed away peacefully in her early hours of Sunday morning, May 31, 1942, at her home in Margate. Mrs. Mayhew was formerly Katherine McKay, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert McKay of Clifton. She was a woman of sterling character, and of a sunny and quiet disposition, and went about in her own quiet manner, wherever possible. She was a faithful member of the Margate W.M.S. and her seat in the Margate church where she worshipped was never vacant when her health permitted her to attend. She was often visited during her illness by her pastor, Rev. John Sienkiewicz.
