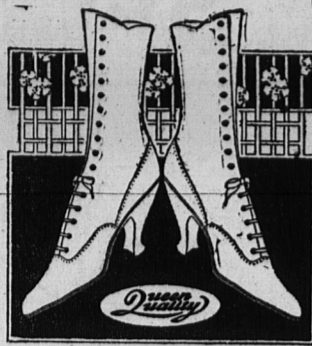

A MILLION TONS OF SHIPS BUILT IN U. S.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—American ship yards will complete 1,000,000 tons of shipping by March 1. Chairman Hurley of the shipping board held a conference of Atlantic coast builders and Government officials called to discuss speeding up the shipbuilding program. "In the whole of 1916," said Mr. Hurley, "we turned out little over 750,000 tons. We will achieve in the next four months far more than we achieved in the 12 months. The new goal of our achievements is ten times the production of 1916. But we can't achieve this by ordinary methods, by normal energy or by average initiative. "This is an extraordinary period in the country's history. We are confronted with an abnormal task and must apply abnormal methods. Every ounce of our energy and initiative must be directed toward the achievement of the greatest task ever imposed upon a nation in war."

The chief subjects taken up at the meeting were increasing the labor supply and better co-operation between the Government and ship-builders.

two and a half years the commission has undertaken and carried out the purchase of all supplies for every department of the public service in connection with the war. These supplies have been purchased chiefly for the Department of Militia and Defence, the Department of Naval Service and the Department of Justice in connection with internment operations. There has been no patronage list in the War Purchasing Commission which has bought all supplies by tender after public advertisements or circular addressed to all known sources of supply in the country.

According to an announcement just made by the Military Hospitals Commission additional accommodation for over six hundred soldiers in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island will be ready within three months. By remodelling Government House at Fredericton and adding a new wing of 300 beds accommodation will be provided for 425. There is also being erected a recreation and locational building with seating capacity for 450. By adding to Government House at Charlottetown accommodation for 215 beds is being made with complete installation for hydro-therapy treatment, dental service and surgical suite. A vocational building and recreation hall seating 300 is also being erected there. The Dalton Sanatorium at Wiltshire is having an addition of 50 beds made to it. A vocational building is also being provided there. A new 600 bed hospital is also being erected at Camp Hill, Halifax, and the work is well advanced. This will bring the total accommodation for convalescent soldiers in the maritime provinces up to approximately 2,250, which is of course, in addition to the discharge depot at Halifax and St. John.

BRITISH GOVT HAS SUBSIDIZED BREAD

BALTIMORE, No. 1.—An explanation as to why England is selling our flour 57 per cent. a barrel less than in this country, and why the price of bread there is cheaper, was made on the floor of the Chamber of Commerce here today. The official statement said that it had been the endeavor of the British Government to keep the price of bread within the reach of the masses and without unnecessary hardships to meet its cost. To carry out this policy, the statement says: "Commencing on September 17, the Government fixed the standard price of flour at \$7.38 per barrel and the uniform price for bread at 18 cents for a four-pound loaf, with a one-pound loaf at five cents. Already \$200,000,000 has been appropriated to apply as a subsidy to sustain these prices."

KAISER WILL DECIDE ON DEFINITE POLICY. WASHINGTON, D.C., Nov. 1.—Berlin dispatches received here by way of Switzerland say that Emperor William through the head of the Civil Cabinet has informed the majority party leaders in the Reichstag that he will make a definite decision during the coming week on the subject of the Government's policy.

PLEDGES JAPAN'S AID UNTIL GERMANS ARE THOROUGHLY BEATEN

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—Japan's full co-operation with the Allies in the world war until Germany is crushed was pledged by Dr. T. Masao, chairman of the Japanese Parliamentary mission of five at a luncheon given in honor of the mission here today by the Japan society. "The Japanese are determined to cooperate with the United States until the last," Mr. Masao said, "and will not stop until our monster enemy, Germany, the pirate of the seas, the assassin of the air and violator of all decencies on land has been completely crushed. When this monster enemy of ours has been thoroughly beaten down, then, and then only shall we have a lasting peace."

HIGHER BOOZE, FEWER JAGS.

NEW YORK, Oct. 31.—A marked decrease in intoxication cases in the last three months, attributed to the increasing cost of liquor and to more intensive employment for men, due to war conditions and labor scarcity, was reported today by the municipal board of health. Never before, the report says, has the alcoholic ward in the city hospital had so few patients. At the chief city magistrate's office it was said similar conditions prevail in the police courts.

ISLANDER DESCRIBES LAST DAY AT THE FRONT

Letters from M. A. Nicholson, Hunter River, 105th Battalion, to his sister Mabel of Brookline, Mass.— No. 4 General Hospital, France, Aug. 23, 1917. Dear Sister:—Just a few short lines to let you know I am alive. I have been wounded by a gun shot in the left thigh on the 16th "nothing serious". I ought to be thankful to God I was not killed as quite a number of my comrades were. You know the Canadians made a big drive which was very successful also very exciting, we got as far as the German lines, I was under heavy shelling for a day and a half before I was wounded, I walked out myself as there were several other wounded boys with me and believe me we went some as the shells were bursting all around us. However we got out alive, had our wounds dressed and sent to the hospital in an Ambulance. We got first class treatment. The Sisters are wonderfully kind, we also had an American Doctor visit us several times. I expect to be sent to England soon, will write when I get there. With lots of love, MACK.

TETANUS GERMS FOUND IN VACCINE STORES. ST. PAUL, Minn., Nov. 31.—Health officers were asked today by manufacturers of vaccine sent here for use in vaccinating against smallpox to return it, as in certain instances it had been found to contain tetanus germs. The vaccine was accordingly shipped to Washington, where it will be analyzed. How the supposed tetanus germs got in the vaccine is unexplained, though it was suggested that enemies of the country might be responsible.
