Allison Scores Tennis Upset By Defeating Fred Perry To Advance To U.S. Title Round

Briton Suffers Injury In First Set Which Will Keep Him Out Of Tennis For At Least A Month. Allison Will Meet Wood.

FOREST HILLS, N.Y., Sept. 11.—(A.P.)—Wilder Allison of Texas scored the greatest upset of American tennis in years today when he defeated Fred Perry of England in the semi-final of the United States tennis championship.

The 31-year-old veteran, who took a licking from the sparkling Briton in the final a year ago and again this year in the Davis Cup challenge round at Wimbledon, gave the finest exhibition of his career in dethroning Perry in straight sets, 7-5, 6-3, 6-3.

Sees Jealousy As Outcome Of Ranking Tests

NEW YORK, Sept. 11.—Official tennis ranking lists create nothing except bad feelings and should be abolished like any other nuisance, declares Henry (Bunny) Austin, England's second-ranking star and Davis Cup ace.

"I believe that ranking lists do as much harm as anything else in the game, leading to jealousy and unfriendly rivalry which would not exist without them, and which should have no place in a game which was originally designed as a recreation to create friendship and good feelings," Austin told Gayle Talbot in London.

"It is no doubt true that to the enthusiastic follower of lawn tennis ranking lists are interesting, and that it is amusing and fascinating for them to discuss the rival merits of the players whom they follow. But these discussions should take place in the club lounges and should not appear in print," Austin said.

Austin's blast against the annual fall picking pastime scarcely could be attributed to personal displeasure. The steady Briton has been accorded fourth place in the world's "first 10" for the last two years and is certain to be ranked equally high this season. He might even climb into third place at the expense of Jack Crawford, the Australian star who has had a poor season. But he doesn't believe it is either fair or possible to rank the world's players accurately.

"Allowing," he says, "for the fact that Fred Perry is indisputably the world's best player, and that Gottfried von Cramm, Jack Crawford and Donald Budge should fill the next three places in that order, what can we do next?"

The obvious answer is, of course, that Austin can, first off, plant himself in there somewhere. Even though Budge, the meteoric young American, did score a surprising win over Austin in the Wimbledon quarter-finals, the ease with which "Bunny" reversed the verdict in their Davis Cup encounter made it extremely doubtful that the coast youngster can be ranked ahead of him this year, at least.

Very few of this group, Austin points out, have played against each other. And when they do, the outcome depends largely upon whether they play on hard court or grass. He would back Wood on a wood surface, but would favor both

Louis Makes Short Work Of Sparring Mates

POMPTON LAKES, N. J., Sept. 11.—The chocolate soldier from Detroit, Mich., Joe Louis, lost his temper with a couple of impudent sparring partners this bright, sunny afternoon in the pleasant Jersey countryside.

As a result all the warmth and sleepy good humor of the day, departed simultaneously from the chocolate soldier and for the sparring partners. Instantly there was two hits, two runs, and two errors on the part of the impertinent helpers.

The brown boy who battles Max Baer in the Yankee Stadium, Sept. 24 in what looms as a return of the old \$1,000,000 gates, never looked better than he did cooling off Lou "Tiger" Flowers, a big negro from Long Island, and Salvatore Rignello, a 210-pound Italian, who once was a considerable prospect.

For some time Flowers has nursed the idea that he can lick Joe Louis, and today with 1,500 looking on, he apparently decided to prove it. He whacked Joe a vicious right on the chin in the second round. The bomber got mad. His head came down, his eyes flashed. His hands moved so fast you could scarcely follow them.

Rignello, making his first appearance, was scheduled for two rounds. He started tossing right hand smashes into Louis in the first. Joe sighed again, went to work. Two left hooks to the chin, a right cross, and Rignello stumbled to a corner.

"No more," he said. "I box him two rounds tomorrow. Now my arm is sprained."

LOUIS TOO SURE, BAER THINKS
SPECLATOR, N. Y., Sept. 12.—Max Baer sounded off in old-time style today and told the world just why he thinks he'll beat Joe Louis in their heavyweight match at the Yankee Stadium Sept. 24.

"Louis isn't as sure as he pretends of beating me," Baer said. "I am seriously considering taking a punch at him at the weighing in scales just to show him who will be boss on the night of the 24th."

"Louis, at 21, is facing just a situation as I experienced at the same age. He's meeting a better man. When I was the same age I met Ernie Schaff in New York and received a lesson that, in my experience, I didn't expect."

Baer boxed five rounds today, two with Tony Canzella and Willie McGee, and one with Lou Snozza. There will be six rounds of boxing tomorrow with Paul Pross as an extra sparring mate.

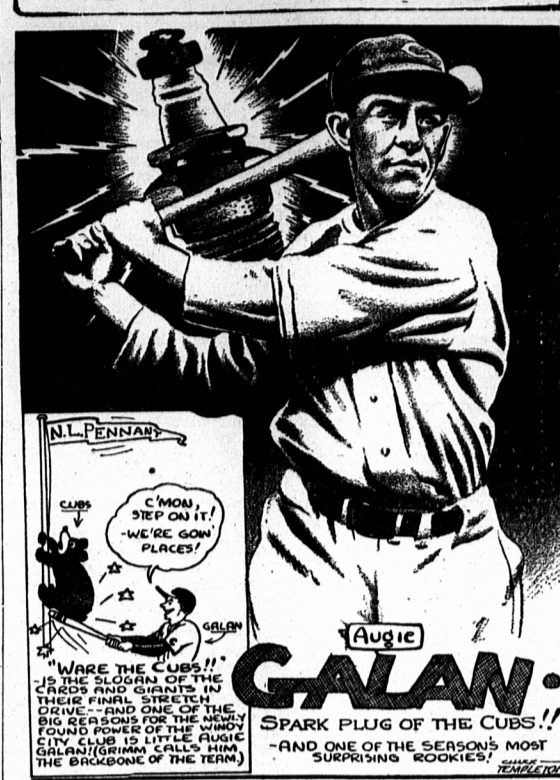

Chicago Cubs Press Cards For League Leadership As Giants Lose To Pirates

NEW YORK, Sept. 11.—Paul Dean, wobbly in his preceding start against Boston, pitched masterfully today against Philadelphia, and the World Champion Cardinals maintained their National League leadership, by winning 10-2 at St. Louis.

The younger Dean scattered seven Phillies hits, while his teammates blasted Orville Borgens out of the game in the third inning.

Virgil Davis, Red Bird catcher, started at bat, driving in five runs with three hits.

Pittsburgh Pirates saved themselves from a complete rout at the hands of the pennant-seeking Giants at Pittsburgh when they rebounded out a 10-7 triumph over New York in the series final after losing the first three games.

The Cubs got the jump on Roy Parmelee, who hasn't finished a game in his last eight starts, and due to Paul Warner's lousy swatting piled up enough runs to stand off the Giants' late rallies. Guy Bush, who had outdone Parmelee by failing to finish nine successive starts, staggered through to the end although touched for 16 hits.

Mixing 19 hits with Boston's fielding lapses, Chicago Cubs sped to a 15-3 win over the Braves at Chicago and kept pace a game behind the League leading St. Louis Cardinals.

Backed up by two big innings in which the Cubs sent 11 men to the plate for six runs off MacFadyen and Smith in the fifth and sent 12 men to bat for eight runs off Betts in the eighth, Bill Lee breezed to his 17th victory of the season.

Paul Derringer chalked up his 18th victory of the season as the Reds pounded Brooklyn Dodgers for a 7-4 victory at Cincinnati in their final encounter of the year. That equalled his high mark for any season since he has been in the National League.

The triumph left the teams all square for the season with 11 victories each although Brooklyn won the series 3-1. Kiki Cuyler's homer with one on in the fourth completed the rout of Tom Zachary and virtually settled the game.

INDIANS DEFEAT YANKS
NEW YORK, Sept. 11.—Johnny Allen was so startled when he got his first good lead in a pitchers' battle with Mel Harder that he "blew a mile high in the ninth inning and Cleveland Indians scored five runs to defeat New York Yankees 5-4 in their final clash today.

For eight innings Allen pitched one-hit ball and he scored the only run in the first seven.

Earl Averill started the winning drive with a home run; Joe Vosmik, Bill Knickerbocker and Roy Hughes hit singles and Ed Phillips hoisted a high one that went for a double and tied the score when Jesse Hill lost the ball in the sun. Ralph Winegarner's pinch hit brought Phillies in with the winning run.

SEATTLE TEACHERS GIVEN 10 PER CENT SALARY RAISE
SEATTLE, Sept. 11.—Seattle school teachers, beginning a new year, today were granted a 10 per cent, salary increase by the School Board.

The raise will aggregate \$412,000 for the 1935 teachers. It brought salaries to 82 1-2 per cent. of their pre-depression levels. Teachers in King County outside of Seattle received no increases.

One Canuck Survives Third Day Of U. S. Golf Tourney; Little Shoots Sub-par Golf

THE COUNTRY CLUB, Cleveland, Sept. 11.—(A.P.)—After giving the followers of the fairways a sample of his recuperative powers under pressure for two days, William Lawson Little, Jr., wheeled his heavy artillery into action today and mercifully blasted two more challengers out of his path toward a fourth successive national golf championship.

The California "siege gun" avoided the fate that befell a flock of tournament favorites, including Ross "Sandy" Somerville, Scotty Campbell, Charley Yates and his 1934 final round victim, "Spec" Goldman, by the simple expedient of "blowing 'em down" with sub par golf.

Looking for some shooter to tie their star, many correspondents who felt the law of averages, if nothing else, was against Lawson Little winning his second United States title along with two consecutive British amateur titles, concluded Yates as the one man in the field capable of accomplishing the champion's downfall.

But Nash capitalized in the blonde Georgian's few errors to shove Yates out of the picture. The two reached the turn in 35, one under par. It was still all square after the 11th, but on the 888-yard 12th hole—toughest bet of the tough course—Yates committed the dub's error by lifting his head and the dark-haired Canuck went one up.

Nash Seizes Par
As he bobbed his head on the exacting 12th, Yates skimmed his third into a trap. Nash's par five won the hole and a lead he never relinquished. A birdie on the 13th, sent Nash wild in the morning. He made the run in 35 to be four up on Bolesita, who needed 40.

Miss MacKenzie, after an unsteady outgolf that found her one down to Mrs. H. G. M. Wilson of Vancouver at the turn, staided on the second to tie for first with the six holes played in one under women's par for a 4 and 3 victory.

Accompanying the Toronto ace into the quarter-final brackets was Mrs. Joseph Dagenais, Montreal's lone survivor, who eliminated Mrs. E. H. Gooderham, Toronto, one up. It was the second triumph in as many days by the same margin for the Montreal player.

Two other Torontonians also advanced. Mrs. F. J. Mulqueen, accounting for Marcia Moss, Vancouver, 4 and 2, while Mrs. Eric Phillips, sent Ottawa's hope, Mrs. Leo Dolan to the side lines by a 3 and 2 count.

Mrs. C. J. Woerner of Los Angeles remains as the lone United States threat for the title. She got away to a wobbly start against Mrs. R. K. Bearsto, Winnipeg, but rallied resolutely to gain a 2 and 1 decision.

Mrs. S. C. Spenny and Mrs. A. MacAllister, of Vancouver kept British Columbia in the title hunt. Mrs. Sweeney scored an upset 4 and 2 victory over Kaye Farrell also of Vancouver, and considered one of the coast province's top-notch players.
