Chamberlain's Pilot Once B. C. Resident

LONDON, Sept. 15.—Commander Charles Pelly, senior pilot of Prime Minister Chamberlain's "peace" plane, was once a resident of Victoria, B. C., where he received his early education. Commander Pelly is the senior commander of British Airways and has flown more than 1,000,000 miles on the company's European routes, including the night mail to Berlin. He served with the Royal Air Force in Egypt in 1931 and for three successive years held the officers' lightweight boxing championship of the Royal Air Force. He was born in India in 1908.

LABOR URGES PARLIAMENT BE SUMMONED

Canada Asked To Back Britain In Peace Effort. (By Harold J. Fair, Canadian Staff Writer) NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Sept. 16.—A resolution by organized Canadian Labor calling upon Prime Minister Mackenzie King to summon Parliament immediately to decide the Dominion's policy in the event of a European war was passed here today by the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada. The action was precedent-shattering, marking a reversal of congress policy toward war.

U.S. President and Cabinet Colleagues Confer On Crisis

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—(AP)—A cabinet officer walked from President Roosevelt's conference table today and said of the situation in Europe: "Some of the strain has been relieved but it is still tettering." This was taken to mean that, so far as the United States Government knows, Europe remains on the brink of war despite recent peace efforts.

Steady Stream Of Sudetens Cross Border Into Germany

SCHILDBACH REICHERNBACH, Germany (near the Czechoslovak Frontier)—Sept. 16.—(AP)—A steady stream of Sudeten Germans estimated by German officials at 16,000 had poured across the border from Czechoslovakia into Germany—and tonight they were still coming. By every means of conveyance and foot men, women and children came singly and in groups to find temporary refuge in dance halls, assembly halls and gymnasiums converted into emergency quarters in German border towns.

Indian Potentate Offers Services To King And Empire

BIKANER, RAJPUJANA, India, Sept. 16.—(CP) HAVAS.—The Maharajah Bikaner has offered his services and the resources of his kingdom to the British Empire. He said "I have the honor of my house and my state never to have wavered in rendering aid to the British crown at all times, in war and in peace."

Move To Ensure Grading Of Oysters

(CP By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, Sept. 16.—To ensure grading of oysters in Prince Edward Island will be satisfactory, the Department of Fisheries has amended the fisheries regulations by Order in Council and the notice appeared today in the Canada Gazette. Under the new regulation the Minister "may authorize lessees of oyster areas to fish for and retain oysters that are not of less than three inches measured in a straight line across the widest diameter of the shell."

Prayers For Peace Asked In Canada By Anglican Bishops

QUEBEC, Sept. 16.—(CP)—Prayers for the preservation of world peace were asked at the House of Bishops of the Church of England in Canada. Opening their annual meeting here, the bishops drafted the following message: "We, the members of the House of Bishops of the Church of England in Canada, conscious of the gravity of the present situation and of the tension in international affairs, send to our people throughout the Dominion this brief message of confidence in God and hope of a peaceful outcome, brought nearer by the noble efforts of the Prime Minister of Great Britain and his colleagues."

"No Automatic Obligation" To Apply Sanctions, View

GENEVA, Sept. 16.—League of Nations machinery for punitive measures against an aggressor crumpled further today. Great Britain agreed along with the so-called "neutral" nations, that she would not apply economic or military measures against an aggressor. The immediate reaction of many delegates to the League's Assembly meeting was an impression that the move was of importance in event of a Czechoslovak appeal to the League, should there be German aggression against the war-cracked republic.

Capture Of Wusueh

SHANGHAI, Sept. 17.—(Saturday)—(AP)—Japanese dispatches today reported Japan's capture of Wusueh, 100 miles down the Yangtze River from Hankow, giving the Japanese control of a boom obstructing river navigation. Occupation of Wusueh, 27 miles up-river from Kluksing, would open the way for attacks on Hanchuan and Kichun where there is reported to be another river obstruction. Japanese authorities announced capture of Shanghai, about 75 miles east of the Peiping-Hankow Railway. It is along this railway that the Japanese army is marching into the provisional Chinese capital.

TO CONTROL WATER LEVELS

OTTAWA, Sept. 16.—(CP)—Under a new convention between Canada and the United States the International Joint Commission will be empowered to control the level of waters in the Rainy Lake watershed, it was announced today.

Protest Proposed Removal Of Quints

TORONTO, Sept. 16.—(CP)—Protesting the proposed removal of the Dionne Quintuplets from the Dafoe nurse near Callander, Ont., to a new home, a deputation of businessmen and councillors from that vicinity, awaited on Hon. Gordon Conant, Ontario Attorney General, today. "The quintuplets have flourished physically and financially at Callander," said Kenneth Morrison, storekeeper in the northern centre. "I estimate upwards of \$400,000 has been spent in and about the village because the quints were there. All this will be a dead loss if the sisters are moved to a new home at Trout Lake, which we understand is contemplated."
