HON. FRED. PETERS.

A rumor was current on the streets yesterday that Hon. Fred. Peters might be invited to contest the seat for West Queens when Sir Louis Davies retires, and that on securing his election he would be taken into the Ottawa Cabinet as a vote of combined representative of Prince Edward Island and British Columbia. The rumor is too absurd to be dignified with this notice were it not that persons of some standing appear to give it credit.

No doubt both the Provinces named would like to have Cabinet representation, but there is an old and true proverb about the difficulty of "serving two masters." The difficulty in this case would be the greater from the fact that the two masters or Provinces which Mr. Peters would be required to serve are more than three thousand miles apart. The Colossus of Rhodes spread its two feet so wide that ships could sail between, it is said. The rumor referred to would make of Mr. Peters a political Colossus so great that to him the brazen original would be in comparison but a pigmy.

But there are other difficulties. Mr. Peters, on whom Prince Edward Island has conferred the highest honors she had to bestow, left us in the lurch to seek great fame and fortune on the Pacific coast. We fear that the new love would still be warmest in his heart, however the older love might linger in that quarter. Under such circumstances it is clear that British Columbia ought to furnish the seat in the Commons, which Mr. Peters is well qualified to fill with ability. Should he gain a Cabinet seat by that route and method many old friends on the Island would rejoice, and we should all feel that when Columbian interests were not at issue the Island would, in him, have "a friend as court." But when it came to a question whether sundry millions of public money should be spent in the West or in the East we fear that the millions would follow the Star of Empire and the westward course which Mr. Peters has himself taken.

Mr. Peters' "treasure" is now in the West, and in most cases mind and heart are where the treasure is. This Island has so far selected its representatives from among those who have an Island domicile, and the rule if not likely to be soon departed from.

After all it is not so easy to give away 375 millions of dollars in the way that would do most good. Mr. Carnegie has really a hard problem before him as the reader will see if he will but undertake to put himself in the great man's place. The problem is to give a vast sum for useful purposes without increasing the natural helplessness, slothfulness and pauperism with which so many are afflicted; on the contrary to stimulate intelligence, industry, independence and generosity. Clearly the subject will require Mr. Carnegie's best attention for a prolonged period.

Complaint is made that some public men in Canada do not properly regard the Sabbath day. It is mentioned that on the last Sunday in June Hon. Mr. Borden, Minister of Militia, not only did not attend service in Toronto, but departed on an excursion from Toronto to Buffalo. His Excellency Lord Minto is said to have spent last Sunday sailing on the Seguenay, and the announced program for next Sunday, when he will be in Nova Scotia is that His Excellency and party will leave St. Peter's Canal at 3 p. m. and arrive in Sydney at 8 p. m. Such conspicuous examples of public men secularizing the Sabbath cannot be regarded without concern. The Government of Canada are responsible for His Excellency's program, as the Ministers also are for their individual action. We join with the Presbyterian Witness in the call to "Stop It!"

PREMIER FARQUHARSON'S ILLNESS.

Many readers will join THE GUARDIAN in sincere regret for the reported serious illness of Premier Farquharson. He had during the year or two past given a measure of work and attention to public affairs which was perhaps beyond his strength. It was disinterested service performed without remuneration, and these facts must strengthen the feeling of popular regard and sympathy. A trip across the Continent during the heated term is trying even to a person in robust health, and must be doubly so to one whose strength has been somewhat reduced by overwork.

We most sincerely hope that on his return to the cooler climate and invigorating breezes of his native Island the Premier may quickly regain his old time vigor. His presence at the head of the Province is distinctly needed at the present time.

There are now six vacancies in The House of Commons, the seats being West Hastings, West Durham, in Ontario, Beauce, L'Islet, St James division of Montreal in Quebec, and York, N. B. When West Prince becomes vacant the number will be increased to seven. When all these by-elections come on we may perhaps learn whether the government is gaining or losing the public favor or merely holding its own.

The United States census shows that 33,411,688 of the population live in cities or towns of over 4,000. This is over 37 percent of the total. In 1890 the city population was 32 per cent. If account were taken of those living in still smaller towns it would amount to several millions. The Canadian census will no doubt show a like tendency to concentrate in the cities. This arises from two causes—the desire for the more numerous privileges and advantages which the cities afford, and the fact that with modern farm machinery a much smaller rural population can produce a given amount of food stuffs than could produce the same quantity in former years.

Hon. J. W. Sifton, father of the Minister of the Interior was interviewed in Toronto the other day in regard to the Manitoba prohibitory law. He expresses hope that the law will be sustained by the Privy Council, but says that should it turn out otherwise a new measure, as full as provincial powers may warrant, will be enacted in its place. In Manitoba every electoral district has a branch of the Provincial Alliance. "The result is not in doubt," says Mr. Sifton, "as the prohibitionists can carry not only the rural districts but every city and town in Manitoba. We can carry Winnipeg for prohibition at any time. We have a public sentiment in Manitoba which wants prohibition, and will fight until it gets it."
