HALIFAX BEAT ST JOHN MEN

HALIFAX, Oct. 19.—Three to nothing was the score in a game of football between the Wanderers and the Marathons of St. John played on the Wanderers grounds yesterday afternoon.

About 1,500 people were present to witness the encounter between the Halifax and St. John teams. A number of football enthusiasts from St. John accompanied the Marathons to Halifax to cheer them by their presence during the game.

The game was of somewhat uninteresting character, owing to the fact that, from beginning to end, with but few exceptions, it consisted of a series of scrimmages. The Marathons were lighter than their opponents and consequently the Wanderers had the better of the scrim. The Wanderers, moreover, showed their superiority in heeling out the ball and thus getting it to the half line oftener.

DREADNAUGHT'S BIG GUN TRIAL

PORTSMOUTH, Oct. 19.—The Dreadnaught carried out her gun trials in the open sea yesterday with the most satisfactory results.

After the tests of the lighter guns, the Dreadnaught fired her ten and twelve inch guns, first singly, then in pairs, and finally all eight of them. Each gun was loaded with the full service charge of 300 pounds of cordite and an 850 pound projectile. The vessel stood the strain of the enormous broadside splendidly. There was not the slightest disturbance to her structure, and only slight damage to the lighter fittings of the superstructure.

THE PRESIDENT AND MANAGER

Of Ontario Bank On Trial For Making False Returns To Ottawa

TORONTO, Oct. 19—(Special)—That for five years Charles McGill manipulated the monthly statements of the Ontario Bank in order to conceal losses in the stock market, now aggregating almost a million and a half dollars; that for five years monthly misstatements of the bank's affairs were signed by the President of the bank as being a truthful and an accurate return of its condition, this, in substance will be the contention in the trial of the President and ex-manager of the Ontario Bank which today began.

EDWARD PRIDDLE WAS MURDERED

This is Belief of Boston Police—Search Being Made For His Body

BOSTON, Oct. 19—(Special)—A deep and apparently unsolvable mystery has developed here in the strange disappearance of Mate Edward Priddle of the schooner Free Trade of St. John.

For several hours the city police assisted by members of the Free Trade's crew and other water front searchers, have been dragging the waters near Atlantic Avenue for the body of the missing sailor who, it is feared, has been robbed by harbor pirates and cast overboard.

It is known by friends of Priddle that nothing would cause him to go away. That he has been foully dealt with is the opinion of the local police and alien detectives have been placed on the case to try to solve the mystery.

ENGLAND'S NAVAL ECONOMY ASSURED

LONDON, October 18.—The government is determined to economize and has decided to take advantage of the system of placing ships in reserve with nuclear crews which already have been well tested for efficiency.

When fresh admirals are selected next year for the three great sea-going fleets, an opportunity will arise for changes in the disposition of the men of war because of new political circumstances, notably the entente with France.

SEVERE CYCLONE ON CUBAN COAST

Kills Twenty People, Wrecks Shipping, Unroofs Houses and Breaks Wires

HAVANA, Oct. 19—(Special)—Twenty were killed and scores injured and great destruction caused by the cyclone which began here on Wednesday and lasted till this morning.

The greatest damage was done on the harbor and along the docks. Many small vessels were wrecked, several houses blown down and trees were uprooted all over the city.

Telegraphic communication was destroyed. Much damage was also done on the northern shore by the cyclone and on the Florida coast.

AMEER TO MAKE TOUR OF INDIA

LUCKNOW, Oct. 19.—The forthcoming tour through India of the Ameer of Afghanistan will be conducted with great pomp and ceremony. It is the first time that the Ameer will have left his own country, and he will bring with him an imposing retinue of some 1,500 persons.

He will leave Cabul on November 21. The Ameer has circulated a proclamation in Afghanistan stating that the visit will not be a political one, "as all such matters were settled when the British mission was at Cabul, and the terms were announced at the time."

PRAISE SOLDIERS WHO SHOT GIRL

ST. PETERSBURG, October 18.—After investigating the killing of Miss Samogova, the young medical student confined in the central prison of St. Petersburg, who was shot dead by a sentry, September 10th, when she showed herself at the window of her cell overlooking the courtyard, the commander of the St. Petersburg has thanked the soldier who killed the girl and has given him a reward of five dollars. In addition the soldier is upheld in the order of the day as an example to his comrades of the faithful performance of duty.

The prisoners claimed that the sentry fired without any warning or provocation, while the sentry said he ordered Miss Samogova four times to leave the window, where she and some of her companions were taunting members of the Semenovskiy regiment with the part they had taken in the suppression of the revolt at Moscow, which resulted in the assassination of General Miu, who was formerly colonel of the regiment.

TWO DEAD AND SCORES ARE ILL

Guests at Silver Wedding Poisoned by Gelatine Dressing With Chicken

HAMILTON, Oct. 19—(Special)—As a result of eating gelatine dressing in chickens boiled in copper pots, eighty-five guests at a silver wedding feast were taken suddenly ill and two are dead from ptomaine poisoning.

Others are critically ill, including Hector and Mrs. Foster in whose house the feast was held.

ATLANTIC LINERS HAVE HARD TIME

NEW YORK, Oct. 16.—Stories of heavy seas and rough voyages were brought by the four trans-Atlantic liners arriving here. The French liner La Touraine encountered the gale last Monday and suffered some minor damage from heavy seas. One particularly big wave boarded the port bow and swept aft, wrecking the port lights of the officers mess room and the captain's cabin. The mess room where the officers were at breakfast, was flooded and the partition separating it from the petty officers' quarters was smashed. Captain Fajolle, who was on the bridge narrowly escaped being washed overboard.

Mrs. Laurena Henson, twenty-one years old, an exceptionally handsome Danish girl, arrived here Sunday on the White Star liner Cymric. She was going to meet her lover, a young man named Johnson, of Northwood (Ia.). As is the rule in such cases she was detained at the detention station at Long wharf. Yesterday an affidavit arrived, sworn to by Johnson, declaring he intended to marry the girl. A board of special inquiry decided that Johnson must come on from Iowa to claim his bride or that an investigation be made of the young man's intentions. Col. George B. Billings, immigration commissioner, wants to be sure that Johnson is able to care for the girl and that his intentions are all he claims. The authorities at Washington will look up Johnson's career, and on their report will hang the fate of the pretty Danish maiden.

MAID BEHIND BARS AWAITING HER LOVER

BOSTON, Oct. 19.—The happy romance of an enterprising Dane and a faithful and persevering Danish maiden, which has progressed for many months in spite of thousands of miles of intervening land and water, has been rudely interrupted by the immigration officials in this city, and now the girl, who has travelled far to see her lover in this country, is behind the barred windows, and iron doors of the detention station at Long wharf.
