ANNUAL MEETING OF RIFLEMEN

The Annual Matches of the Provincial Rifle Association were continued yesterday at Kensington Range. In the forenoon the Banker's Match was completed and the first stage of the Prowse Match was shot. In the afternoon the second and third stages of the Prowse match were shot; this match and the Special Tyro match were concluded last evening.

Weather conditions yesterday were the whole worse than on the first day of the meeting, and veteran marksmen declared that the shooting was the hardest and most uncertain for some years. Only one possible was made on the range—that of Mr. Judson at 200 yards. The light throughout the day was puzzling, the targets and the butts appearing alternately in light and shade of varying intensity. The wind too was extremely tricky and gusty, and varied from four to twelve degrees left. At times too a drizzling rain fell, almost obscuring the targets and making the sighting almost impossible. Despite the conditions, however, there was good average shooting and some high scores were made. As usual, Capt. J. M. Jones, the Bisely marksmen did remarkably steady shooting and secured 94 in the Prowse match 30, 33, 31, at the three stages. Last year, it will be remembered, Capt. Jones made in this match, the excellent score of 100. In the "special aggregate" made up of the scores at 500 and 600 yds in the Lieut Governor's, the Hodgson, the Banker's, and Prowse matches Capt. Jones leads with 195 points and wins the Governor General's Silver Medal, repeating his performance of last year; Staff Sgt. J. M. Crockett, gets second place with 188, and wins the Bronze Medal.

Today the Corporation Match, the Ladies Challenge Cup Match, and the Ladies matches will be fired, and it is expected that there will be a large attendance.

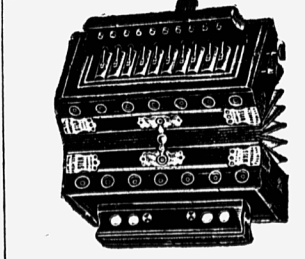
