The latest news, first of all.

C. L. Baxter, Portland, was registered at the Victoria yesterday.

W. Fred Forbes, Port Vernon, was among the visitors to the city yesterday.

On Thursday next five prohibition cases will come up for hearing before the Magistrate.

Mrs. Dr. McIntosh, Murray River, was in the city yesterday, registering at the Victoria Hotel.

A. P. and Mrs. Prowse, Murray Harbor, were in the city yesterday. They were at the Victoria.

Lloyd Cox, Morell, and L. Wood, Mt. Herbert, were among those registered at the Queen Hotel yesterday.

Martin Dalton and Thos. Martin, City, were recent visitors in Georgetown.

At the Police Court in this city yesterday James Power was fined ten dollars or thirty days. He had been drunk.

The City of Ghent was in Summer-side yesterday and took away nine carloads of oats besides a lot of other farm produce.

A new warehouse is under construction at the Marine Wharf. This will provide greater facilities for the handling of freight during the winter months.

A. Lord, City, Agent of the Department of Marine, is in connection with the establishment of a life-saving station and the drilling of the life-boat crew at that place.

Two prohibition summonses for first offence have been served upon John Kelly Weymouth Street, City and Robert Strong, King Street. Both are returnable on Thursday next.

The crew of the C. G. S. Stanley have been transferred from that steamer, which now lies at Halifax, to Picbou where they will join the Earl Grey.

The C.G.S. Aberdeen arrived in port yesterday morning from West Point, bringing with her seven coast buoys. She will take up some more buoys near Charlottetown Harbor and then proceed to Halifax.

The little daily Examiner, in summing up the number of Taylor soap coupons, picks out but four of all the dealers in this City, and gives the number that the three favorable of these received, in each case of which those cut from that paper exceeded those from The Guardian. It however is not fair enough to state that at the fourth store, at which was by far the largest quantity, the number was over five times as great as that from The Examiner thus easily totalling a greater number from The Guardian, even under such adverse circumstances. Furthermore in a most conspicuous place on the first page of The Examiner where everybody could at once see it there appeared a local item by the firm which received the largest number of Examiner coupons and even then that number was but about two and a half times as great as that of The Guardian, so that it was probably the item rather than the page advertisement, which attracted the few who took advantage of it. That paper further charges The Guardian with printing an extra number of copies of that date, but the statement is false, as but the regular quantity was issued, and moreover no more city papers than on any other day of the week. The purchase of soap is however no argument for a good paying circulation for advertisers, as it is well known that many hundreds of this paper's city subscribers are a class of people who could not be induced to go to so much trouble to obtain a cake of soap, and it was city circulation in this case. The Guardian does not want to take the lead in a cake of soap competition, the latter is not among the principal lines of goods, which constitute the bulk of the retail and wholesale trade of the world. That paper failing to state the number of coupons received, which were from its city circulation, gives a pretty good idea of its value, and it is no doubt the bulk of its entire diminutive circulation. The Guardian challenges the Examiner to give a sworn statement of its regular daily average circulation as appears in this paper today, and moreover its regular daily average city circulation.
