**"WHEN DOCTORS DIFFER"**

Sir.—As I read with interest the letter of Dr. Simpson, Pleasantville, U. S. A., in this evening's issue, I cannot help recalling the dictum of Abraham Lincoln: "When choosing advice avoid the faddist or idealist." Dr. Simpson is an idealist and a very fine citizen at that, but from his boyhood he has been trained and educated in the tenets of extreme prohibition. Today he sees only what he wishes to see, and avoids the unpleasantness of coming in contact with the actual conditions under prohibition in his adopted country. He is one of the salt of the earth, and if there were 100 million more of his character and principles in the United States Prohibition would probably prove a success. But there are not, and so those in a position to look facts in the face to investigate conditions as did the Boston Post and other newspapers, find that Sir William Arbuthnot Lane's judgment on conditions was much nearer the truth than Dr. Simpson's predilections and prejudice would concede. I am recently returned from the States, and have covered a good deal of territory on business and pleasure bent, and although a Liberal and former supporter of prohibition I must honestly confess the conditions prevailing there appalled me. The law was so freely broken that my wife and I came to the conclusion that it was there for show only, not for observance. I do not drink at home, and I did not indulge while away, but if I had so desired I could have got all I wanted. Business men freely offered me liquid refreshments, and we were taken to restaurants where men and women drank freely, and uninterruptedly.

If queried most people with whom I came in contact about the success of prohibition, and without a single exception I was told it did not prohibit. Many admitted conditions were better than in the days of the open bar, but the general complaint was that more young people of both sexes were drinking spirituous liquors than before. A prominent citizen of Boston said a young man was considered a "poor fish" by the flappers unless he carried a flask. We were brought up differently, and though I have invariably supported prohibition I am not blind to this sequel to its adoption. It is hard to admit as Dr. Simpson finds that our ideal has not been realized but nevertheless I am constrained to confess the "cure" we applied has proved worse than the "disease." Realizing this, then, is it not only honest, and business like to discard what has turned out a failure, and seek to accomplish our ends by some other means? That is how it occurs to me, it may be wrong again, but any way I am going to give Government Control a trial. It cannot be

worse in its results than the present state of affairs.

**MRS. WRIGHT'S IMBECILS AND IDIOTS.**

Sir.—We had with us in our hall at Cape Traverse last night Mrs. Gordon Wright, the lady with the "sob stuff" in her delivery.

Mrs. Wright is one of those speakers who appeals to the emotions rather than to the reasoning faculties. She paints her pictures with a skilful hand and trusts that her audience carried away by her imagery will neglect to notice that at least half of what she utters is just plain hallyhoo; vote catching sentimentalism that will not stand the test of cool-headed consideration.

She declared during the course of her remarks that she had received a letter from her husband in which he stated that Ontario was already bitterly repenting the decision which it had made "in the heat of an election campaign."

Now what I should like to know is who is this husband of hers that he can so accurately estimate the feelings of the people of Ontario concerning a law that has been in force about two weeks.

How have the people of Ontario expressed their repentance that Mr. Wright alleges is theirs? Has he received communications from all the people or even a majority of the people that they are donning the sack cloth or has he read it in the faces of the passers-by? Or is this feeling of repentance just a fond illusion that Mr. Wright wishes was present and so creates out of the stuff that dreams are made of?

A little later Mrs. Wright stated that this question of the good or evil of Government Control is so simple "that the wayfaring man, though a fool, need not err therein," implying of course that the majority of the people of Ontario are of a lower order of mental defective than fools; undoubtedly imbeciles and idiots. And yet according to her beloved husband those imbeciles and idiots of Ontario who could not see what a fool would be expected to see before the election have awakened to the evils of Government Control before the evils or threatened evils have had time to manifest themselves. This is just one example of the logic that Mrs. Wright dished out to her audience at Cape Traverse last night. And at least a few of them to judge by their comments after the show swallowed it all and licked the spoon. One ardent admirer said, "She took the people by storm." If throwing dust in people's eyes is taking them by storm, she certainly did.

Let me state two of the "big" arguments that the prohibitionists are advancing against Government Control. (1) People who will not drink liquor under prohibition because of their respect for law will be tempted to drink it when it is sanctioned by law. (2) I will not be safe to go out in cars if Government Control becomes law.

Let us look carefully into these two arguments. Let us suppose for the moment that the prohibitionists are right and that law-abiding citizens who do not drink today will drink under Government Control. Now those people who do not mind breaking a statute or two for the sake of a drink of liquor will get their liquor under either law perhaps, there is certainly no "perhaps" about their getting it under prohibition and even if it be granted that they will also get it under Government Control then those new drinkers who are evidently expected to do all the killing with their cars must be the respectable law-abiding citizens of today. Has it not occurred to the prohibitionists that if all these terrible murders are due to take place in our midst under Government Control, that at least four-fifths of it should be going on now, as there isn't a doubt but that the very worst element of our people are getting all the liquor they can drink today and that this liquor is the very kind that would be likely to drive a man to disregard the rights and safety of other people? So this lurid picture that Mrs. Wright is painting is just a phantasma of a brain that has become "over-heated" in the heat of an election campaign.

Premier Stewart has seen that conditions as they now exist are intolerable. He has come squarely and honorably before you with a solution to the difficulty. Give him a chance. **Wide Spread Interest In \$50,000 Swim**

TORONTO, Ont., June 4.—Wide spread interest is evident in the swimming marathon for a \$50,000 prize which will be held in Lake Ontario on August 31, of this year.

With the arrival in Montreal of Ernest Vierkoter and Otto Kempe, the two representatives for Germany and Madame Jane Sion, of Brussels, Belgium, European swimming champion.

Mrs. E. M. Herbert, better known as Della Sullivan, of Holyoak, Mass., has forwarded her entry blank and will be accompanied in the swim by her husband, Dr. Herbert. Mrs. Sullivan-Herbert won the Montreal marathon swim last Labor Day, George A. Creagan, of Paterson, N. J., who swam in the Santa Catalina Channel competition is another prospective American candidate, with his brother, Andrew, who has also signified his intention of entering the competition.

To date entry blanks have been received from 102 natorial experts. Of this number 60 will represent the United States, and 32 will wear the Maple Leaf. The balance of the list will be made up of swimmers from Italy, Egypt, Belgium, Sweden, France, Norway, Germany and England.

The United States army has two representatives, Staff-Sergeant Kircher, and Higley Wheeldon, both of West Point, H. F. Crockett of Austin, Texas, will probably have a delegation of 500 persons from the lone star state to cheer him on his way. An annual invasion of Canada is made by this number when a visit is usually made to Niagara Falls. However, this year tentative plans are being laid to have the excursion continue to Toronto to witness the swim and, since Crockett is the only entrant from Texas he will probably have plenty of support. A party of Canadian swimmers has already established training quarters at Birch Cliff, near here, and it is expected that before long American entrants will commence training for the long grind in the cold waters of Lake Ontario.

**MRS. JOHN DEWAR**

The death occurred at "Newlands", Charlottetown, on May 11, 11 o'clock yesterday forenoon, of Jessie Stewart, widow of the late John Dewar.

Mrs. Dewar had reached the rare age of one hundred years, having been born in South Lake, Prince Edward Island in 1827, a daughter of the late Peter Stewart. She was the last surviving member of that family.

In 1855 she married John Dewar, of Lot 48, and here the family remained until 1902, when they removed to their present home at "Newlands", where Mr. Dewar died in 1912.

Mrs. Dewar had always enjoyed excellent health, until a month ago, when it became evident that her long life was drawing to a close. However, she was only three or four days in bed before the end came, and her peaceful passing was like one falling asleep.

She was a member of the Church of Christ, and a true Christian woman in all respects, possessing the splendid qualities of mind and heart characteristic of her Scottish ancestors.

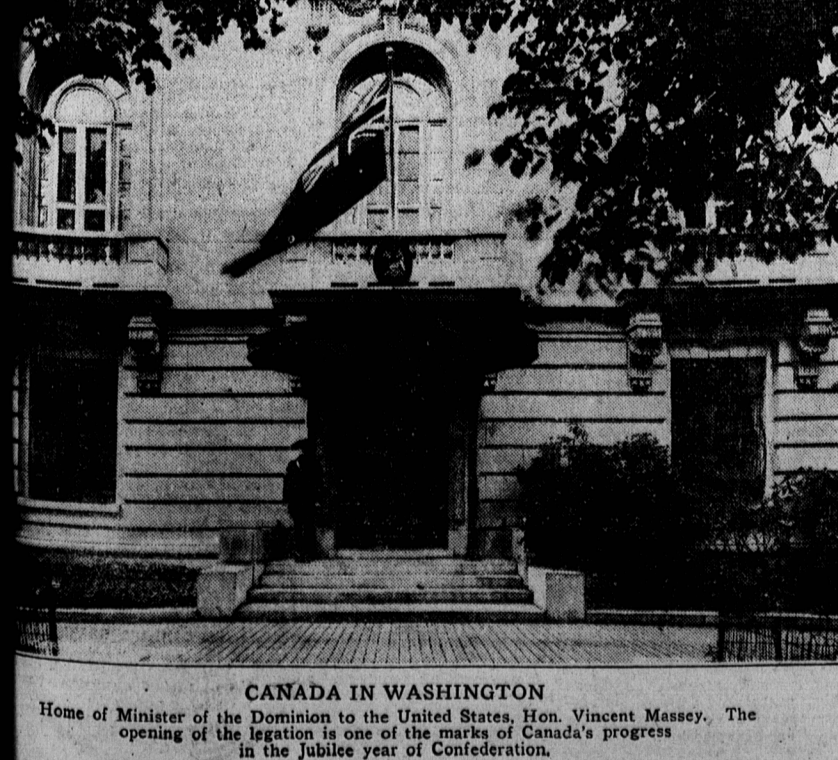
