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FOOD BENGERS

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NEW METHOD OF PRODUCING ANESTHESIA.

PARIS, Oct. 19.—At the Academy of Medicine this week Prof. Jounesse, the dean of the medical school at Bucharest, read a paper on the new method of producing anesthesia by injecting a solution in water of a new combination of strychnine into the brain and spine of the patient. According to the professor, a record has been kept in more than twelve hundred operations in which this method has been employed, and not a single accident has resulted. He believes that the new method does away with the necessity of administering chloroform. The solution is injected into the vertebral column around the spinal cord and also at the base of the brain, producing temporary paralysis, but the patient does not lose consciousness nor suffer pain. By injecting the solution at proper points either the lower or upper part of the body may be affected. Although this method is generally regarded as dangerous and few surgeons are practicing it, Prof. Jounesse maintains that it is really much safer than the old method of administering anesthetics.

WEIRD EXPERIENCE AND A BRAVE ACT

Captain F. J. Roden, of the Clan Line Steamer "Clan Macneil" has just addressed the following letter to the Secretary of the Imperial Merchant Service Guild:—

"Sir, I beg to bring before your notice the brave act of my Second Officer, Mr. Harley. While my vessel the S. S. "Clan Macneil" was loading at Queen's Dock, Glasgow, quite recently, the Chief Officer observed bubbles coming up between the Quay and the vessel. Shortly afterwards a man's head appeared above water and immediately disappeared. The Chief Officer being unable to swim called to the Second Officer, who was near at hand, and he, without any hesitation, jumped overboard. After rescuing the body, it was found to be the corpse of a working man who seemingly had been dead for some considerable time. REPAVING FLOOR OF ST. PETER'S

LONDON, Oct. 19.—An important work in St. Peter's has just been begun, and will occupy about ten years. It is the repaving of the vast edifice which the feet of the crowds visiting it during the centuries succeeding have worn away. It is estimated that it will cost about £80,000 to restore the twelve thousand square metres of pavement damaged, and this only represents about one half of the total surface.

The restoration will be a work of patience, for it is intended to supply the place of each old stone with one precisely similar. But it is here that the difficulty presents itself. Where are the marbles to be obtained.

Many of the species used for the original pavement are no longer obtainable. They came from the ancient Roman temples, from the columns and tablets found buried in the earth, and today such finds are very rare. Nevertheless the Chapter of St. Peter's has been able to acquire some of these rare marbles. The remaining portions will have to be sought from the quarries of Carrara.

PEARY MAY TAKE PLATFORM SOON.

NEW YORK, Oct. 19.—There is a strong probability that Commander Robert E. Peary will soon reconsider the resolve he made upon his return to civilization not to appear in public until after the controversy between Dr. Cook and himself should be settled.

It is probable that Commander Peary will soon take the position that is submission to records and observations to the Board of managers of the National Geographical Society in Washington, being the only course left open to him, will absolve him from further adherence to his determination of reticence.

Probably the first semi-public appearance that Peary will make will be as the guest of the Peary Arctic Club at a club dinner tendered in his honor here. Heretofore the club has always greeted the commander upon his return by giving him such a dinner, but because of his desire not to be made the object of any honoring functions upon his last return, this event had been postponed.

A member of the club said yesterday that if Peary and his legal adviser, Gen. Thomas Hubbard, president of the club, decide that the pole-finder had better adjure his desire for seclusion, that dinner will be given some time in the near future.

The commander has made absolutely no plans for a possible lecture tour, it was said today, and if he does consent to lecture while the settlement of the controversy is in abeyance, the geographical society will be the first to hear him.

GAVE \$5,000 FOR COLLEGE IN CHINA.

BUFFALO, E. Y., Oct. 19.—Inspired by the addresses at the opening convention of the National Campaign of the Laymen's Missionary Movement, in this city, John K. and W. B. Walter, Jr., two prominent business men, gave \$5,000 to St. John's Episcopal College, Shanghai, China, tonight.

The gift was made by the well known missionary, Dr. F. L. H. Potts, after he had concluded an address, in which he spoke of the need of the Christian educational institutes in the celestial empire. Other large gifts are reported.

BALLOON WAS COATED WITH ICE.

WOBURN, Mass., Oct. 19.—Having passed through two snowstorms, the balloon Boston landed here at 4.30 today, covered with ice, after making the 39 miles from Fitchburg, where the ascension was made in two hours.
