Fine Week End Bill At Capitol

Those two outstanding Orientals, Anna May Wong and Sessue Hayakawa were very much worthwhile at the Capitol Theatre yesterday, where they are featured with Warner Oland, the original Fu Manchu, in a new episode of the fascinating Sax Rohmer series, filmed by Paramount as "Daughter of the Dragon."

For those who like romance seasoned with puzzles, thrills and action evolved from lurking mystery, this production talks right out and says big things to any movie audience.

Miss Wong is an Oriental actress of obvious personable points, who surrenders to her dying father's wish, and drops a glamorous point of vantage in London's theatrical firmament to project a program of vengeance. With all his fiendish application of chemistry and psychology, Fu Manchu was not a more resolute menace than the pretty daughter proves to be. Loved by an exalted gentleman of her own race, loving an English nobleman, she allows her heart dictates no chance to defeat the accomplishment of her oath.

Chapter eleven of the serial and three excellent short subjects round out a fine week end bill.

PULITZERS PRIZE AWARDS

NEW YORK, N. Y., May 5.—(A.P.)—The catchy tunes and unbridled satire of "Of Thee I Sing" has made it the first musical comedy ever to win the Pulitzer prize for the best original American play of the year.

Frankly terming the award "unusual," the trustees of Columbia University announced the \$1,000 which accompanies it would go to George S. Kaufman and Morrie Ryskind of New York who wrote the book and to Ira Gershwin, brother of George Gershwin, the composer, who wrote the lyrics.

The prize was one of 14 in the fields of journalism, music and art announced tonight. They have a total value of \$17,000.

In the field of journalism, the much cherished \$500 gold medal for the most distinguished and meritorious public service by a United States newspaper during the year was given to the Indianapolis News. Walter Duranty of the New York Times and Charles G. Ross of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch were given the \$500 prize for the best example of correspondence during the year.

John T. McCutcheon of the Chicago Tribune won the \$500 award for the best cartoon published by a United States newspaper during the year. The cartoon, "K wise economist asks a question" was printed Aug. 19, 1931.

No winners were announced for two other annual journalism awards. The prize for the best work by a reporter was deferred and none was made for the year's best newspaper editorial.

General John J. Pershing's book, "My Experience in the World War" won for the Commander-in-Chief of the American expeditionary force to France the highest single award of the 14. He was given the \$2,000 prize for the best book of the year upon the history of the United States.

Pearl S. Buck's novel, "The Good Earth," which has been a best seller for months, won for her the \$1,000 prize for best novel published by an American author. Mrs. Buck, now in Nanking, China, where her husband is a professor in the University of Nanking, based her book on life among the Chinese masses. She told of the effect of war and famine in a manner, the board said, that "gives an undistorted picture of the life described."

Henry F. Pringle, a former New York newspaperman who now writes biographical material for magazines, won the \$1,000 award for the best American biography teaching patriotic and unselfish services to the people. His book, "Theodore Roosevelt," the board said, "presents a vitalized portrait of an outstanding American."

"The Flowering Stone" by George Dillon won the prize for the best volume of verse published during the year by an American author. The board said Dillon's "verse seemed most original and authentic."

Francesco Roggeri of New York received the annual \$1,000 scholarship to the American Art Student

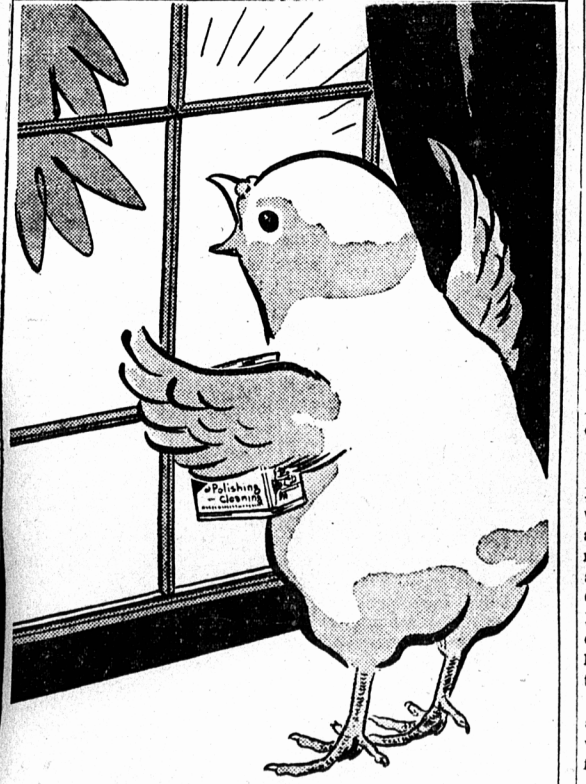
