Open for Traffic

ESSEN, Ma 20.—M. Letroquer, French Minister of Public Works who is on a visit to the Ruhr watched with a good deal of satisfaction today while the Polish workers under the protection of French soldiers loaded cars of coke and coal for shipment. M. Letroquer visited the mines and coke plants at Oberhausen. Westerholt and other points which have been seized by the French. NOTES ON THE FIFTH P. E. ISLAND EGG LAYING CONTEST FOR THE TENTH WEEK ENDING MARCH 13TH 1923

The Charlottetown Egg laying contest made a further gain of 78 eggs during the past week. The total for the week was 862. Same week last year 480 eggs were laid. Total to date 6792. Same date last year 3512 eggs. 188 hens added to the records during the week. There are now only 8 hens that have not started laying. Mr. J. J. McGillivray's hen No. 6 was highest to date with 82 eggs. The Experimental Station hen No. 181 was second with 80 eggs and Mr. D. F. McDonald's hens No. 7 and 9 tied with 78 eggs each for 3rd place.

Mr. Wisener's pen of White Wyandottes were first with 55 eggs. Mr. McDonald's pen of Barred Rocks were second with 52 eggs. Mr. Everett Howatt's White Leghorns were third with 50 eggs. Mrs. Charles Wyand's and Mr. L. B. Tombs and Pendleton's Barred Rocks tied with Mrs. Ramsay's and Mr. McGillivray's White Leghorns with 48 each for fourth place. Mr. Brown's Barred Rocks were fifth with 46 eggs. Mrs. E. P. Bulpitt's White Leghorns tied with the Experimental Station pen No. 18 for sixth place with 46 eggs each. Mr. E. Howatt's Rhode Island Reds tied with the Experimental Station Leghorns No. 15 for seventh place with 43 eggs each. Mr. Wendell Graham's Andalusians were eighth with 41 eggs. Mr. H. L. Machona's Barred Rocks were ninth with 39 eggs and Mrs. James E. Daly's Barred Rocks were tenth with 38 eggs. The Experimental Station pen of White Leghorns No. 18 leads ninth with 301 eggs.

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The visitors have a boy marvel on their team. Lamb is his name and he is only seventeen years of age. He put up a great brand of hockey, and made two or three goals after brilliant rushes. Billy Hay, of the visitors' defence, put up a fine game. Billy is a Truro boy and years ago played on the Truro team. Joe Crockett, of Halifax, refereed the game. He only handed out one penalty, and that was drawn by Bill Hay in the third period. Play opened with Truro in possession of the rubber, and for ten minutes Truro hurled shot after shot at the Sussex goalie, who turned them away as fast as the locals would shoot. Lamb, of Sussex, managed to get the puck and started up the ice, let drive at Guinan and sagged the twine for the first goal. Play wavered back and forth for some time until Hopper got the puck, and after a rush passed to Billy McKay, who tied the score 1-1.

In the second stanza Le Clair got the puck at the face off and started for the Truro net, but McMillan grabbed it and passed to Hopper, who tried. Their second counter came when Billy McKay scored from a mix-up. Sussex repeated a few minutes later, when LeClair went up the ice and scored from centre. Truro forced the play and Phil Hallisey rushed up the ice and tried for a counter, but Pinnigan turned it aside. George Wilson was in on the rebound like a flash and forced the puck in for number three. Shortly after Billy McKay scored another on a pass from George Wilson and repeated again when he sent it in from a mix-up. Sussex forced the play into Truro's territory, but Jack Smith got the rubber and took it down the ice and scored from the wing. Score 4-2.

Sussex were out for victory at the opening of the final session, but within two minutes Billy McKay sagged the twine for another counter for Truro. Lamb secured the puck and after a brilliant end to end rush passed to the defence and scored. Truro repeated a few minutes after when Billy McKay sent in the eighth counter. Sussex tried hard to even up. Le Clair secured the rubber and passed to Radcliffe, who scored. Truro tried to get a few more past Pinnigan but they failed. Score, 8-4.
