opsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

The sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

KILLED IN ACTION

Mr. John Whelan, Covehead Road has received a telegram stating that his son, Pte. John Edwin Whelan, Infantry has been killed in action on Sept. 27th. Pte. Whelan left here with the 105th Battalion and was transferred to the 26th Battalion and later to the 78th. He crossed to France in April and had been in the various actions recently fought. He was 21 years of age. Much sympathy will be felt for the bereaved parents of this gallant young soldier and other members of the family.

Mrs. Agnes Wiggins of this city has received a telegram bringing the sad news that her husband Private Charles Kingsley Wiggins had been killed in action on September 30th. Private Wiggins left here with the 105th as a signaller, but was afterwards transferred to another battalion. He took part in quite a number of battles in France before receiving his death wound.

He was for a time employed with the Telephone Company here and was a young man of most exemplary conduct and character.

He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. George Wiggins of Danville, a brother of Mrs. Geoffrey Fitzgerald, Charlottetown and a nephew of Lady Davies, Ottawa.

He leaves to mourn a widow and three young children to whom the sympathy of a wide circle of friends will be extended.

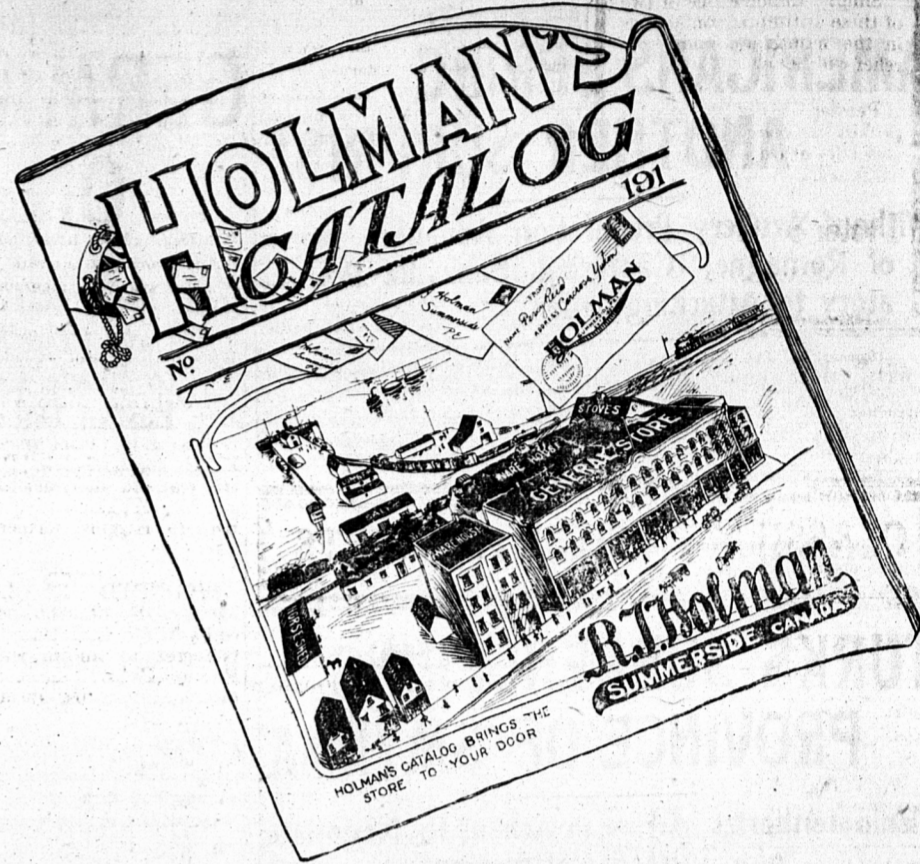
