A GREAT ELECTION YEAR.

We know that a few months hence the United States will elect a President. It seems to be settled that a general election for the Imperial Parliament will be held before the new year. It is also more than probable that the present Canadian Parliament, which has already held five sessions, will be dissolved and that a new election will be held before the present year and century close. These elections though held in the nineteenth century will make their influence felt throughout the entire Anglo-Saxon world, and almost entirely in the years of the twentieth century which is now so near.

To a very large extent all these elections will turn upon affairs of imperial or world-wide interest. The British elections will have to do with Chinese, South African and Australian affairs, the relations with all the great powers, and with the ordering of a new era in the concerns of the British Empire itself. The United States election has for the first time the great question of a world-wide expansion before it, and the new and enlarged sphere of interest and relation toward the outer world which has recently been entered upon. So, too, in Canada the affairs of the Empire and the world and the relations of Canada thereto will be wall to the front in the coming federal campaign.

Things are not as they were in any previous election in Canada in regard to our imperial relations. Since the election of 1896 two important things have occurred which mark new departures that must have most important consequences. One of these is the inauguration of preferential trade, by which the manufactures of the United Kingdom are admitted to Canadian markets at one third less duty than the like products of foreign countries. The other is the voluntary sending of three thousand men to distant South Africa to fight imperial battles. In regard to this latter incident both our great parties are pretty nearly at one. In regard to the trade question their views are widely divergent.

The Conservative party contention that the preference given by Canada to the Mother Country's products ought to be met by a like preference, or discrimination in favor of Canadian products in the British market, challenges our attention and is worthy of it. Being an issue between the two parties, it will bring into the coming election a more general discussion of our relations with the Mother Country and the Empire at large than we have hitherto had, and may be hoped to

lend a dignity to the campaign which has been too frequently wanting. It may devolve upon Canada to point the way in which our world-wide Empire shall hereafter order its family affairs and the manner of the closer relations hereafter to subsist between the Parent State and the outlying dependencies.

Like the great Republic beside us, Canada looks out upon two oceans. Our trade concerns reach eastward, southward and westward. We are next neighbor to a mighty nation at the south, between which and ourselves grave questions of boundary, of fishing rights and commercial relations are pending. One third of our people claim a blood relationship with France. We are next neighbors to Europe, to China, Japan, Russia and Africa across the seas. Our affairs are world-wide. It is no longer a time for parish politics, for trivial local concerns, or for childish personalities, in this last great election year of the nineteenth century. For both within and beyond the Empire of which we form a part there are great concerns to engage the attention of our public men and great issues at stake which demand our best abilities and our highest wisdom in statecraft. We trust our statesmen, both Liberal and Conservative may rise to the elevation of so great an occasion.

In Honor of King Humbert's Memory.

BOSTON, Aug. 14.—The salute of minute guns, 21 in all, the highest in number ever given in this country and used as a national salute, or in honor of the President, was fired from the navy yard battery at noon to-day in memory of King Humbert. The salute was suggested by Dr. Brindisi, Italian consul in Boston, and the committee of the leading Italian citizens, and their wish was immediately accorded by Rear Admiral Sampson, with permission from Washington.

Invalided Canadians.

London, August 14.—The invalided Canadians had another ovation at Liverpool where the Lord Mayor of that City addressed them. He referred to the fact that one of the Canadians had eleven bullet wounds.
