## WINTER NAVIGATION.

While we in Prince Edward Island have had somewhat unusual trouble in keeping our winter steamers running, the people of Quebec have been earnestly advocating a scheme to open the St. Lawrence in winter by ice-breaking steamers. The sanguine advocates of winter navigation on the St. Lawrence are perhaps unconscious of the difficulties and appear to be unaware of what has recently transpired in other parts of the world in this same matter of winter navigation. For it is not only in the Gulf waters that the ice-breakers have had a hard time during the opening winter of the new century.

The St. John Telegraph reminds the Quebec people that there are some sixteen ice-breaking steamers employed in the Baltic Sea, some of them of great power, and they have during the present winter for a long period quite failed to carry on the work for which they were constructed. In fact the sound which separates Sweden from Denmark has been so blocked with huge ice-floes and bergs that the people have been crossing from one kingdom to the other on foot. It is true that at Elnore the strait is narrow, probably not wider than the distance between Cape Tormentine and Cape Traverse, but such an ice-pack as has occurred there this year appears to be unusual.

At the same time the very powerful ice-breaker Baikal, built last year by the Russian Government to ply across Lake Baikal in Siberia and afford steam connection between two sections of the great trans Siberian Railway, has failed to do its work and was compelled to suspend its trips. These incidents show that winter navigation in the icy northern regions is subject to great difficulties, whether in the old world or in the new, and that the best science and constructive skill have been in part baffled in the effort to overcome these difficulties. It would be well therefore to go slowly in the matter of making costly preparations for the winter navigation of the St. Lawrence at the present time.

There was expended on the Militia force of Canada during the year ended 30th June last the large sum of \$3,615,206. This includes \$1,427,502 for the troops sent to South Africa down to the date above mentioned, and which by no means covers the entire cost, a considerable portion of which will fall into the current year. The total above given also includes an expenditure of \$161,493 on capital account for arms, ammunition and defences at Esquimaux, B. C., \$71,203 for rifle ranges, and \$118,235 for the provisional garrison at Halifax. The annual drill of the Militia cost \$424,000.

It is sometimes pointed out that in the service of monarchical countries the promotion of titled, or influential persons sometimes outstrips their personal merit and qualifications. But even in Republics this is also sometimes the case. The Boston Herald points out that it pays to be the son of a great general. Frederick D. Grant, son of the great General Grant has been at various times promoted over the heads of 804 captains, 277 majors, 93 lieutenant-colonels and 177 colonels in the regular army. General Grant himself won his promotions in a different manner by great ability and hard fighting.

Referring to the recent attempt of Mr. O'Donnell to address the Imperial House of Commons in the Irish language, which he was not permitted to do, it is pointed out that there is but a small portion of the Irish people who can not speak English. By the census of 1891 there were 38,121 who could speak Irish only, 642,053 could speak both Irish and English. It seems probable that all or nearly all of the population with the exception of the above noted 38,121 could speak English. Some of our own legislators would appear to have as strong a pretext for addressing the Island Assembly in Gaelic at Mr. O'Donnell had for addressing the Imperial Commons in Irish. Probably if the Gaelic were attempted in our Local House the incident might be treated as amusing rather than irritating.
