## Crown Evidence Not Completed

### In Case Of George Smith Who Is Being Tried For Manslaughter At Supreme Court. Will Continue To-Day.

## Left Husband Price Of Rope To Hang Self

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Jan. 14.—After reciting the will she said she had suffered at the hands of her former husband, Mrs. Hilda E. Tingle bequeathed him \$1 to buy a rope to hang himself with.

The will, written January 2, 1930 was probated yesterday, disposing of the rest of a \$2,150 estate among relatives. Mrs. Tingle, widow of Moses Tingle died December 18.

Her first husband, to whom she was married in January, 1917, the will stated, "never supported me, only gave me trouble and caused my health to fail."

The trial of George Smith for manslaughter began yesterday at the Supreme Court before Mr. Justice Arsenault, the evidence for the crown occupying the greater part of the day. Several witnesses were examined. Attorney General Thane Campbell conducted the prosecution, while Mr. J. J. Johnston, K. C., conducted the defence.

The report of the Grand Jury was received in the afternoon.

When Court opened in the morning the jury reported "No Bill" against Herbert Gallant charged with theft.

Walter E. Darby, Barrister of the Court of Nova Scotia, was, on motion of Mr. Thane Campbell, sworn in as a barrister of this Court.

After he had taken the oath Mr. Justice Arsenault welcomed Mr. Darby to Bar of this province. He made reference to the fact that he had a distinguished career in college, and that Mr. Darby and himself had been friends during school days. College degrees are marks of ability, he said, but the study of law is never finished. He felt sure Mr. Darby would be an honor to the Bar.

Mr. Justice Saunders also complimented the young attorney and felt sure he would carry on with the same degree of success as that which he had during his term at college.

## SWORN IN AS CHIEF JUSTICE

TORONTO, Jan. 14.—Mr. Justice Roper was today sworn in as Chief Justice of the High Court of Ontario by Lieut.-Governor W. D. Ross. The new Chief Justice, who fills the vacancy caused through the resignation of Chief Justice R. M. Meredith, is also president of the High Court Division of the Supreme Court of Ontario.

## G. A. STIMSON AND CO. MAKES ASSIGNMENT

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 14.—Four constituent companies of the G. A. Stimson and Company Ltd., bond brokerage firm, entered voluntary assignments at Osgoode Hall today.

The companies were the National Debenture Corporation, Limited; the Toronto Bond Exchange; the Stimson Building and Investment Corporation, Limited; and the Stimson Canadian Development Company, Limited. G. T. Clarkson was appointed liquidator.

The liabilities of the four firms were stated to be \$1,500,000. Assets were set at \$700,000. G. A. Stimson and Company is listed as the principal unsecured creditor.

## OTTAWA SAID GOOD-BYE TO WILLINGDONS

### Colorful Scene At Station On Occasion Of Departure Of Their Excellencies.

OTTAWA, Jan. 14.—Ottawa said "Good-bye and good luck" to their Excellencies Viscount and Viscountess Willingdon today. In the brightness of a sparkling sharp Canadian winter day, prominent representatives of the political, diplomatic, business and social worlds of the Dominion gathered at noon to bid farewell to the Governor-General and his wife who, for more than four years, have lived among the Canadian people. Bright uniforms of the soldiers who constituted travelling escort and Guard of Honor for their Excellencies, flags and bunting, and a large wreath of beautiful roses with its message of "good luck", added color to the scene.

## Busy Year For Board Of Trade Reported At Annual Meeting Last Evening Mr. G. J. Tweedy Appointed President.

The annual meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade was held last evening in the Board of Trade Rooms, with the vice-president, Mr. G. J. Tweedy, presiding in the absence of Mr. J. P. Crockett.

Following the reports of committees the following officers were elected for the ensuing year:

The secretary read a letter from the Minister of Marine, with respect to a resolution passed by the Board and forwarded to him advocating an increase in power to Island radio stations. The matter had been referred to the radio department.

Several communications were received from the Canadian Chambers of Commerce. The first was relative to a civic improvement programme, with a list of suggested items for improvement attached. The letter was referred to the incoming president.

The second was a letter requesting the consideration of the Board on a resolution passed by the Montreal Board of Trade and submitted to the Chamber to the effect that whereas the application of the Federal Income Tax to Public Utilities is inequitable and unjust in that only those utilities which are privately owned are subject to the tax, while those publicly owned are exempt; resolved that the Dominion Government be urged to take steps to remove the discrimination against customers of privately owned utilities as compared with those of publicly owned utilities either by applying the Income Tax to all utilities whether publicly or privately owned on a basis of gross revenue rather than on profits, or by some other means.

A resolution to the following effect, passed by the Winnipeg Board of Trade was submitted to the Charlottetown Board for consideration:

Whereas cereal products have increased to such an extent that western farmers have large quantities of coarse grain on hand with no profitable outlet, and whereas the production and finished products of live stock is a practical outlet for this surplus.

And whereas the production of live stock in the Dominion of Canada is far short of meeting domestic consumptive demands, much less catering to any export market;

Therefore be it resolved that our cattle products should be increased so as to satisfy our domestic needs, and encouragement be given to the production of well-finished cattle of good breed and proper type and of a quality suitable to meet the needs of the British market.

That dairying be developed more generally as an essential part of every farm program not only to meet our

## WILL BENEFIT ARCHIVES BLDG PRESENTED TO NOVA SCOTIA

HALIFAX, N. S., Jan. 14.—The first Provincial Archives Building to be erected in Canada was formally opened this afternoon, when W. S. Chase of Wolfville, donor of the building, presented Premier Gordon J. S. Harrington with the key to the structure. For two years the identity of the Nova Scotian who made the work possible had remained unknown, and Mr. Chase's connection with it was announced for the first time today.

## TRANSPORTATION

The report of the Transportation Committee was presented by Mr. R. E. Mutch who stated that the year just closing was an unusually busy one for the committee, but the results obtained are apparent, and the efforts made were worth while. As a result of an interview with Superintendent McNutt relative to the speeding up of the mainland service there was considerable paring down on the scheduled time of trains making mainland connections. The creation of a sub-station at the crossing on Fitzroy Street was an objective not attained. Daily ferry service was gained in part, as mainland communication was promised for twelve Sundays in midsummer.

The decease of Mr. H. V. Buntain was a severe loss to the committee, and as a result much work had to be left to a special committee. During the year reports for double train service, and reduction in automobile traffic rates on the car ferry, were presented to the Board of Railway Commissioners.

## Exhibition Ass'n Is Enthusiastic

### Splendid Success Of 1930 Exhibition Commented Upon At Annual Meeting.

The Annual Meeting of the Provincial Exhibition Association was held in the Secretary's office, Provincial Building, yesterday afternoon, all the directors being present with the exception of Hon. George E. Hughes.

The Directors' and Financial reports were submitted by the President, Mr. James Paton and the Secretary, Mr. J. W. Boulter, and on motion were adopted. The Directors' report which is herewith published, showed a most successful year, in fact the greatest in the history of the Association as far as attendance and exhibits were concerned. The financial report showed a deficit for the year of \$3,719.73 which was accounted for by the fact that a new building, primarily for the purpose of housing the Silver Fox Exhibition, had been erected and other repairs and replacements made to the property.

The former Board of Directors were re-elected with the same officers for the ensuing year.

Among those present who took part in the discussion was the Hon. W. M. Lea, Premier of the Province, who gave a short address which was very greatly enjoyed, being full of good information and kindly, helpful suggestions. Premier Lea has been a wonderful friend of the Provincial Exhibition, preaching its usefulness in and out of season, and is a member of the Advisory Board. Among other things he complimented the President, Mr. James Paton, on the great interest shown by him and the great amount of time he gave to the work without recompense. He thought the other directors and the shareholders were also entitled to a great deal of praise for the efforts, the former expended on the Exhibition and the fact that the shareholders had ungrudgingly spent money on the enterprise from year to year without receiving any dividends.

The presence of Mr. Roy Ings of Port Hill was gratifying to all present. His family have been associated with the Exhibition as shareholders for many years and Mr. Ings himself now located in the western part of the Island, is sure to take an active interest in this good work.

Mr. J. Walter Jones gave some interesting information regarding fairs elsewhere and suggested some new features for the program which will in all probability be tried out this season.

Mr. E. T. Higgs was greatly pleased with the showing made and offered some suggestions. He regretted the absence of the Hon. George E. Hughes through illness and suggested that a letter be sent him conveying the sympathy of the meeting and advising him of his re-election as vice president.

## Deserved Tributes

Colonel D. A. McKinnon then spoke and he referred particularly to the Hon. Mr. Lea who had by suggesting a change of dates made possible the great success of the past three years, and by other generous help through himself and his government, such as the providing of an office in the Building and the assistance of Mr. Boulter as Secretary Treasurer, helped to make the fair a financial success. Mr. James Paton as president had done wonderful work. The Colonel thought it was a grand thing that a man of Mr. Paton's age could take such an interest and display so much energy in a public enterprise.

No reward of any kind goes to Mr. Paton except the knowledge of good work well done. Mr. Boulter is the right man for secretary. He has the good will of all the horsemen and everywhere we go around the Maritime we hear nice things said about Mr. Boulter. As you are aware his services are given free to the Association. ## GRAND JURORS URGE RIGOROUS ENFORCEMENT

### Cite Alarming Increase In Highway Accidents In Province.

Yesterday in the Supreme Court the following report was submitted by the Grand Jury:

To The Honourable  
Aubin E. Arsenault,  
Presiding Judge of the Supreme Court

May it please your Lordships

We the members of the Grand Jury assembled, beg leave to submit the following report:

We regret very much the absence of His Lordship the Chief Justice who is prevented from being present on account of a painful accident and we join with his many friends in hoping for his speedy recovery.

We wish to record our approval concerning the remarks of the learned Judge in his address to the Court and we view with alarm, the increasing number of accidents on the public highway. We recommend that a stronger enforcement of the law be necessary for the safety of life and property and we recommend a more thorough investigation of all accidents.

We visited Falconwood Hospital, the Infirmary and the Convalescent Home. We found conditions satisfactory. Rooms and bedding clean. Food of good quality. The patients apparently contented and tenderly cared for. Dr. McLaughlin, Mr. Payne and the staff of nurses did everything to facilitate our visit. We would recommend that a suitable shed be constructed to house the coal from the weather.

We also visited the jail and here found conditions satisfactory. Here also the jailor Mr. Dwyer, showed us every courtesy on our visit.
