There is danger that the insurance revelations in New York may have a tendency to induce policy holders, to cease paying premiums and allow their policies to lapse, greatly to the injury of themselves or their families. To restore the confidence of such persons Chairman Armstrong of the New York State Investigating Committee has issued a manifesto to policy holders, which is both timely and important.

The insurance companies are by no means insolvent or likely to become so. They are, on the contrary, many of them at least, enormously rich. In regard to them all the law requires that they shall hold reserve funds sufficient for the payment of all policies which may become claims. There need therefore be no fear in the mind of any policy holder in any of these companies that the company will be unable to pay the amount that will be due under his policy when that policy becomes a claim.

This is true alike of Canadian companies and of American companies doing business in Canada. All that has been revealed in no way affects the financial stability of the companies. What the extravagance and misappropriation of trust funds by some of the companies has done, has had the effect merely of increasing the cost and diminishing the profits allotted to the policy holder. The face value of his policy is and has always been secure if the premiums are paid.

And what Chairman Armstrong states with regard to the present and future of the insurance companies is no doubt true. The investigation has already had the effect of stopping extravagance, cutting down exorbitant salaries and imposing new and effectual safeguards against misappropriation. We doubt not that the companies will hereafter be upon a sounder basis than before, and we strongly hope that the rates of insurance may be reduced, or that the profits allotted to policy holders may be increased or even both as a result of the searching investigation now going on.

There is therefore good reasons why policy holders should continue to pay premiums on the policies they have, for they cannot in hardly any case abandon them without at least partial loss of what they have already paid. And even if a policy be dropped in one company in order that another may be taken in another company there will necessarily be a loss in the transfer as the insured will find the rates increased on account of advancing age.

Life insurance to persons having others dependent upon them is just as important and desirable as it ever was to those who can afford to pay it. Policy holders may therefore be fairly cautioned against hasty action in abandoning their policies, if such action is contemplated. They have an investment as safe as ever with prospects of better returns in the future than in the past. The revelations, shocking and alarming as they have been are like a thunderstorm which out of the elemental war brings eventually, a bright sky and more invigorating atmosphere. Policy holders hereafter will doubtless be better protected and assured of better returns than heretofore.

The destroyed workshops were cheap structures, mere fire traps in fact, and in that regard a source of danger to the adjoining buildings. It is to be hoped that the new shops whenever and wherever they may be erected will be substantial and creditable structures.

It transpires that the Tariff Commission will hold a sitting in Charlottetown, probably early in the new year. With this timely notice our farmers through their institutes or otherwise should formulate a plan and appoint spokesmen to present their views on the tariff. Whether they want a higher or a lower tariff, or that the present tariff shall remain, they should be prepared to place before the Commission an authoritative expression of their views.

THE WORKSHOPS' FIRE.

Sir—It was only by the interposition of Providence sending the temning rain, and changing the wind from south to north just before the railway fire started this morning, that saved perhaps half the town from destruction. If ever there was a veritable firetrap allowed to remain in a community, it is in railway shops here. Fire after fire has occurred there and last winter in the same place it had burned through a building but owing to great quantity of snow on the roof and being early in the night, firemen arrived promptly and saved the property at that time. These shacks have been built of the most combustible material and added to as the requirements of road necessitated and being a storehouse for dry lumber, shavings, oils, etc., are especially liable to fire. These shacks are still building, the last being on Water Street between the paint shop and round house, with a tarred paper roof and rough board side with batons to match. It is simply disgraceful to build such a structure opposite respectable houses, while owners are trying to improve their property and the appearance of the city.

While on this matter as a citizen and large taxpayer I would respectfully request his Worship the Mayor and City Councilors to have the encroachments made on Prince School and Water Street by Railway management removed. These include part of the Round House and fence, and no doubt it is cheaper to take from citizens than to buy land even at a half price as evidenced by trials in court last week.
