LONDON, October 15.—Truth says that the naval movement in Canada has been killed by public apathy, just as in Australia it has flourished on enthusiasm. The potent stimulus to naval expansion is lacking in Canada with the proposal that the money for ships and guns be spent out of the country. Canada does not want an armaments ring, and has no enthusiasm for raising recruits, says the paper. Public opinion is said to be against assuming foreign responsibilities, and the nation has no desire to interfere in the affairs of others.

COST OF THE WORLD'S SERIES.

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—Not far short of a million and a quarter dollars was the cost of the recent world's baseball series to the American public. While this amount may be taken as a fair estimate of money directly expended there are many times that might be added to the expense list which are indirectly traceable to the craze of baseball. It is perhaps the most remarkable tribute to the popularity of baseball, when more than 150,000 persons will attend five games and pour into the treasuries of the hotels, railroads, theaters, ticket speculators, club owners, and players and various other beneficiaries, sums that a few years ago would have appeared grossly exaggerated when traced to the national game.

Patrons of baseball have stamped themselves as liberal spenders, and are reckless regarding cost when their favorite pastime is concerned. This applies to out-of-town followers of baseball as well as to supporters of the Giants, Lord McLaughlin, during his recent visit, expressed surprise that the attendance was not better at the contests which set the world's supremacy. He called attention to the fact that the final tie in the English Association football championship at the Crystal Palace, near London, attracts 120,000 enthusiastic spectators. But as a matter of fact the average price at a football game in England is not much more than a quarter, which makes the total receipts about \$35,000 for the game. This is about one-half of the daily receipts at the Polo grounds.

Since the Giants have been winning the National League championship with such aggravating regularity, many out-of-town business men arranged their business engagements in the east so as to make them fall due about the date of the world's series, and these helped to swell the receipts, while not a few fans from distant cities arranged their vacations in order to see the world's championship contests.

NEW PRESIDENT AT WELLS.

AURORA, N. Y., Oct. 17.—Wells College formally installed Dr. Kerr Duncan MacMillan as its president today, in the presence of a number of representative university, college and school heads and general educators. The new president is a graduate of the University of Toronto, and has been for thirteen years a member of the faculty of Princeton Theological Seminary.

SWALLOWED HER TEETH

MONTREAL, October 13.—A peculiar case was treated at the Notre Dame Hospital yesterday when a set of artificial teeth were extracted from the epiglottis of Miss Alice Hamel, 18 years of age, she having swallowed the dental outfit in her sleep on Sunday night. She awakened yesterday morning suffering from a severe pain seemingly caused by some inexplicable obstruction in the food passage. The pain was so great that she did not at first notice the loss of her molars and incisors, but when she finally noticed that they were gone and a subsequent search of the bedroom did not locate them the obstruction in her throat suddenly explained itself. A local doctor was called in and he advised that the young woman be taken to an hospital. At 10.30 she was taken to the Notre Dame Hospital and the medics immediately set to work and in a short time had extracted the teeth leaving Miss Hamel as well as ever.
