R. C. M. P. Presented Show In O'Leary

The spacious Verdun Theatre in O'Leary was packed to its very doors on Thursday afternoon, April 7th when the R.C.M.P. showed a number of most interesting and instructive moving pictures on some of the beauty spots of Canada and showing some of the manifold activities of "Canada's Finest", the Royal Canadian Mounted Police whose motto is "maintain the right" and which is renowned as the force "which always get its man."

The first film was of beautiful Jasper Park in Alberta. Then a most interesting film on the training of the famous R.C.M.P. dogs. The next film was a splendid pictorial account of the celebrated journey of the little R. C. M. P. schooner "St. Roch" from Vancouver to Lunenburg, N.S., taking about 28 months and being the first time that the journey has ever been successfully made through the treacherous ice-infested waters of Canada's great North West Territories. A short film on Prince Edward Island and also a sing-song brought this most enjoyable and informative afternoon to a close.

Between films one of the R. C. M. P. officers explained to the children some of the duties of good citizenship and said that the show this afternoon was part of their educational program on "Youth and the Police" and mentioned that they would be coming around again shortly to the different schools and that they hoped to have a baseball team organized in O'Leary as well as in Alberton and Tishish. The R.C.M.P. are to be highly complimented on this splendid educational venture. The officer thanked the teachers and parents for having the children assemble in such large numbers. He thanked the National Film Board for their machine operated by Henry Clark of Alberton, and to Mr. Milton Smallman and his son for donating the use of their theatre free of charge. All the schools of the district were represented including Knutsford, O'Leary, Mount Royal, Woodstock, Bloomfield, Howlan, West Devon, etc.

In the evening the show was repeated for the adults and again there was a very large attendance.

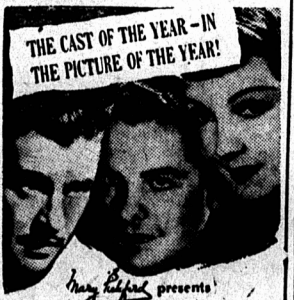
