

Chief Of Police Kane's Resignation Fully Dealt With At Council Meeting

Summerside Council Hears Fourteen Applications For Office.

The subject of Chief Kane's resignation was fully aired at the adjourned meeting of the Summerside Town Council on Friday night, before a large crowd of citizens. The Council met at 7:30 and after dealing with some minor matters and passing a unanimous vote to take over the library and accept the offer of the Carnegie Corporation, the Council went in to caucus, presumably to discuss police matters.

They returned shortly before ten o'clock and the matter of application for Chief of Police was brought before the meeting. Fourteen applications were read, two from off the island, one of Charles F. Rowes of Cape Breton, N. S., and one from Cecil E. McLeod of Truro, N. S., other applications were from Island gentlemen, mostly with police experience.

Coun. Bell then moved that Mr. Kane be appointed as Chief until the end of the year, this was seconded by Coun. Kelly. The Mayor then asked if any of the Council members had any objections to the motion, but Council members remained silent.

Coun. Bell then got up and stated that he wished to have the whole truth laid before the public on this matter which is now before the meeting. Chief Kane, said Coun. Bell, "has generally been conceded to be the best Police Officer the Town has had. He has had considerable experience and has given satisfaction in every way. The life and property of the citizens has been well protected and criminals brought to justice during his term of office extending over three years. Chief Kane was assisted by an efficient staff and also had the guidance of Coun. Phillips, as chairman of the Police Committee. There was nothing of a contentious nature ever came to my notice, nor was there any reflection on Chief Kane until a few days ago."

A meeting had been called to discuss the matter of some commitments which were out and which had not been entered, 23 in number. It is the custom to give offenders time to pay their fines, and this had been going on before and did not originate with Chief Kane, but nothing had ever been said about the matter before. It was this that caused the friction between Coun. Phillips and Chief Kane.

Another meeting of the Police Committee was called and of which Coun. Bell did not receive any notice. He was leaving that day for the mainland, the meeting could either have been adjourned or had been notified he could have remained. The real trouble originated at that meeting.

"I understand," said Coun. Bell, "that at that meeting Coun. Phillips demanded that Chief Kane take a night run. There had been no complaint from the other members of the police force about the night run and yet Coun. Phillips demanded that Kane take a night run. It is always understood that the Chief should be an officer at large, available at all times. Magistrate said, it was necessary that the Chief attend the Court in the morning and be available for the Juvenile Court and therefore it could not be expected for him to take a night run."

"Furthermore I consider Coun. Phillips had no right to differentiate from the usual proceedings of the police department, unless it seemed necessary for Chief Kane to take a night run. To Coun. Phillips request, Mr. Kane stated that he was not in a position to accept a night run, he would rather resign. Kane said, he was given to understand that Coun. Bell was notified of this meeting and had given his consent to these things. This I say is not true as I was not notified and knew nothing of the matter until my return. To Kane's intimation that he would resign Coun. Phillips had replied, he could resign as soon as he liked as far as he was concerned. Through this attitude of Coun. Phillips Kane tendered his resignation."

"Following this a meeting of the Council was called, and before the meeting was held Chief Kane withdrew his resignation, at the request of a number of citizens. Strictly speaking the resignation could not be acted upon and there was a difference of opinion as to what was to be done. There was no charge against the Chief and
