CANADIAN WATER POWER

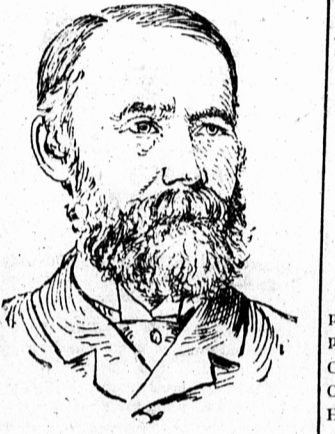

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THE PRIVILEGE OF THE FAMILY OF DE COURCY

LONDON PRESS ON ELECTION FRAUDS

St. James Gazette Says United States Never Did Anything Cleverer, and Hopes it Wont Spread.

MONTREAL, Nov. 22.—A special London cable says: "The Westminster Gazette, referring to the false ballot boxes used in Ontario constituencies says: 'We are sorry that of all parties the Liberal party should be associated with such a disgraceful fraud, and if the allegations are true we can only hope that such punishment will be meted out as will prevent a recurrence of the scandal.'

"The St. James Gazette says: 'The world has much to learn from the new in the manipulation of elections and it is to be hoped that we remain too obtuse to teach. How clumsy are the fine schemes of unscrupulous English electioneers compared with the ingenious ballot box, whose existence has been revealed by a lucky mishap to the Canadian authorities. The United States never did anything cleverer.'
