The boats have been doing good work this winter, so far as conveyance of mails, passengers, &c. are concerned, and were up to regular time except during the ice blockade in February. But we should look at things in a moral aspect. The report of our Province of late, in regard to the free use of whiskey &c. has not been good, but the conduct of those who indulge in this sinful habit aboard His Majesty's mail packet is to say the least, in the highest degree reprehensible.
