ST. ANN'S CELEBRATION The Annual Saint Ann's celebration was held on Lennox Island on Sunday, August 1st. An immense crowd, one of the largest on record, was present. From early morning till mid afternoon a fleet of modern boats was kept busy conveying those who came to Port Hill wharf by car and carriage. As the church could accommodate only a portion of those who wished to attend Holy Mass the altar was moved to the vestibule and there the Rev. Gaudier of Palmer Road offered the Divine Sacrifice while those who could not get inside knelt reverent in the green sward surrounding the church. The choir under the direction of Mr. J. J. Sark, and with Mr. Joseph D. Lellan as organist, rendered very beautifully the Mass of the Angels. His Lordship, Rt. Rev. Louis J. O'Leary D. Bishop of Charlottetown delivered the sermon, which was a masterpiece of eloquence. He spoke of the black robes brought by missionaries who years ago brought the true faith to the Mic-Macs and contrasted the kindly welcome which they received with the harsh treatment and cruel deaths of many who afterwards sought to implant the Christian faith in the hearts of the Innuits. He then proceeded to elucidate the Catholic doctrine of the Intercession of Saints, showing clearly that this in no way derogates from the glory of God, but that the contrary is complementary to it. He spoke feelingly of the great St. Anne, patroness of the Indians of Canada, who is revered as the mother of the Blessed Virgin. He besought his hearers to have recourse to her in their prayers, assuring them that their request would be readily granted. He then read the prayer for the hands of her who was the mother of his Mother, Mass being offered to the crowd divided into happy groups along the river banks and enjoying the delectable lunches brought along and exhibited appetites such as are not often met with in this nature can induce. The afternoon was spent in viewing the beauty spots of the Island and listening to the sweet strains of music rendered by the Grand River Band recently organized by the Rev. John A. McDonald. It is to the Mic-Macs, ably assisted by Fr. Urban Gillis, that the success of the celebration is due.

THE MARKETS MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 4.—The export trade in Canadian grain on the Montreal market today continued extremely dull owing to the fact that foreign bids were still below local exportation views. The market for Canadian western oats was also inactive but prices were unchanged. Only a small trade was transacted in spring and winter wheat grades of flour but prices ruled steady. Owing to the absence of any demand from any source, the milled trade was quiet but values were unchanged. The market for rolled oats was dull but values were unchanged. Prices for all grades of eggs were well maintained in spite of a small demand. Fresh extras were quoted at 37c and firsts at 33c per dozen. Some business was transacted in western grades of cheese at 16 3/8 per pound. The receipts were 5,672 boxes. The butter market was without any new feature to note. No 1 pasteurized was offered at 32 3/4c per pound with few takers. The receipts were 376 packages. The markets are generally firm and unchanged today. The Presbytery of Pr. Edward Island IN CONNECTION WITH THE UNITED CHURCH OF CANADA.

The regular meeting of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island was convened in Hearts Memorial Hall, Charlottetown, on Tuesday, Aug. 3rd at 1 p. m. with Rev. H. Pierce in the chair. Despite the fact that it was in the midst of the busiest season for the lay delegates, the meeting was well attended. The ministers present were as follows: Revs P. A. Fitzpatrick, D. K. Ross, B. E. Carew, G. P. Taitrie, J. M. Hooker, E. M. Aitken, W. M. Ryan, H. Pierce, F. A. Wilson, D. McD. Clark, D. McGowan, R. H. Baxter, Geo. Sears, G. Ayers, C. Graham, M. D. McDonald, F. H. Littlejohns, A. N. Lockhart, F. H. Boothroyd, J. A. McLellan, W. H. Palmer, W. H. Spencer, J. R. Saint, M. T. Charman, M. C. McDonald. The lay delegates were Messrs Moyse, Gregg, Brooks, Smith, Huggan, D. McDonald, Lane, Prowse, Graham, Brown, Barnes, McKenzie, McNair, M. A. McDonald. The following were invited to sit and correspond, Revs. J. A. Greenleaf, Hugh Miller, F. W. Sowdon, A. McKay, D. M. Matheson, M. C. McKinnon. After the regular devotional period the minutes of the last meeting were read and approved. This being the first regular meeting since the opening of the church year, the first matter of business was the election of officers and standing committees. On motion duly seconded, Rev. F. E. Boothroyd was unanimously chosen chairman of the Presbytery for the ensuing year, and Rev. J. A. McLellan, Secretary. A nominating committee to strike standing committees was then appointed, consisting of the following: Rev. Ayers, Wilson, Lockhart, Fitzpatrick and Littlejohns. Their report which was adopted by the Presbytery was as follows: Finance Committee, J. A. McLellan (chairman), F. E. Boothroyd, W. T. Huggan, B. E. Carew, G. A. Grant, (chairman), J. T. McKenzie, H. Pierce, G. P. Taitrie, F. H. Littlejohns, C. W. Moore, J. C. Martin (chairman); E. H. Ramsay, M. D. McDonald, J. R. Saint, M. K. Charman, Church and Manse Building; J. M. McLeod (chairman); G. P. Sear, W. H. Palmer, D. McGowan, Major Townshend. The arrangement committee was reappointed. Committee for Examination of Students looking forward to the Ministry: Chairman and Secretary of Presbytery and Dr. J. R. Saint. Reports were received from the chairman of the various committees appointed to carry out the induction services as arranged for at Conference and provided for in the Policy of the United Church. The Holy Spirit sustained the action of the Breadalbane Synod in recommending Mr. Neil Matheson of Ross Valley as a student for Medical Missions and recommended Mr. Henry Moyse of Central Bayside as a student for the ministry. The name of Miss McPherson, Brookfield was brought before the court as having volunteered for Mission Work in the Foreign Field, and arrangements were made for holding a Designation Service in the United Church, Hunter River on September 8th; the service to be in charge of the chairman of Presbytery. The Secretary then read a report of the W. M. Society. This being received the Secretary was appointed in the name of the Presbytery, to convey the greetings of the court at the coming Presbyterial. A resolution was passed appreciative of the service of Mr. R. B. Whitehead of Toronto, the legal counsel for the United Church of the Property Commission. Mr. Whitehead comes to us, not only as an outstanding member in his chosen profession but as a devoted worker and elder in the Bloor Street Church, Toronto, of which the Minister is the ex-Moderator of the General Council. After some discussion regarding the advisability of changing the date of the August meeting of Presbytery, it was decided that for the future the meeting be held the third Tuesday in July. Rev. A. N. Gillis gave notice that Princeton congregation will be vacant after the end of August and asked that an Interim Moderator be appointed to take charge at that date. Rev. M. C. McDonald of Summerside was duly appointed to that office. The members of Presbytery recalled with regret the lamented death of the late Rev. E. A. Westmoreland and appointed a committee to prepare a suitable record of the same for the minutes. On motion the meeting adjourned to meet at 7 p. m. At the evening Sederunt several matters of business that remained over were considered. They included the report of the Home Mission Committee of Rev. Mr. Fitzpatrick. A communication was read regarding the Prince Edward Island Protestant Orphanage and thereupon were urged to commend this worthy cause to their congregation. An appeal was made by Rev. E. N. Aitken and supported by Rev. C. Graham, on behalf of the Boys

and Girls Work, stressing the need of the Presbytery standing behind the providing of leadership especially at summer camps. A very important matter was brought to the attention of the Court in the form of a remit sent down from the General Council asking for the voice of Presbyterial young men of excellent physique and of ordaining women into the ministry of the United Church. This matter was referred to a committee for consideration which is to report at the next meeting of Presbytery. The business of a very full and interesting meeting, being ended, the Presbytery engaged in prayer, remembering the home recently bereaved by the death of the late Mr. Westmoreland, and with special prayer for the speedy recovery of Rev. John Stirling who has been under medical supervision here for some time through illness. On motion the Presbytery adjourned to meet on the regular date unless the meantime called by the chair.
