Disgruntled Parents Whose Daughters' Beaux Never Know When to Go Home—Is the Anonymous Letter Always Malicious?—To Tell or Not to Tell

Dear Dorothy Dix—Is it lack of refinement and good breeding that causes young men of today not to leave at a proper hour when they call on a girl? The stag habit at dances has now been taken into the home and a girl with one date may find herself with a mob before the evening is over. Young men do not even phone that they are coming, but present themselves unannounced. Instead of the old methods of parents dropping their shoes or giving an occasional yawn as a hint to boys that it is time to leave, it takes the tear gas or the strong-armed method to give them the air. The gigolo is fast becoming a race. Parents of sons often wonder where their boys are in the wee small hours. We fathers and mothers of daughters could tell them.

Answer: Evidently you are feeling peeish after having your night's rest broken by your daughter's beaux, and I certainly agree with you that there are no greater pests than guests who never know when to go home. No human being can be fascinating for more than thirty minutes at a stretch. No one can be interesting for longer than an hour, and two hours is the limit of human endurance on any one's society.

And, of course, a mighty little of the company of boys and girls goes a long way with any person who does not belong to their generation and has not their tastes nor habits nor interests; who does not even speak their language nor get the points of their jokes. But why afflict yourself with this? Why, after you have said "howdy do" to the young men who come to your house, don't you go off and go to bed and to sleep and forget them? After all, you know, daughters' dates didn't come to see you, and any older person is always a wet blanket over the bubbling spirits of the young.

As for chaperoning them, you do that sufficiently when you are on the place. Just the knowledge that mother and father are around somewhere in the background is an invaluable protection to a girl and keeps a party from getting too rough.

Personally, I should think that any mother and father would be so thankful to have their daughter entertain her friends at home instead of rushing off with them to night clubs and on wild automobile rides to God knows where, or parking with them in cars, that they wouldn't care if the boys did stay long after they should have had sense enough to go home.

There is no other one thing that parents make a greater mistake about than they do about the attitude they assume toward the young men who come to see their daughters. Very often this is so hostile that it drives boys away, for no youth with any spirit will go to a house in which it is made apparent to him that he is not wanted. Many a girl owes her old maidenhood to the fact that her grouchy father virtually insulted every eligible youth who came to see her.

Also, there are those fathers and mothers who don't like to have their habits and comforts interfered with, and who insist on monopolizing the living room and their own favorite chairs and reading lights when the girls have company, and after a boy has spent a few evenings in the bosom of the family, with father and mother and grandpa and grandma and little brother and little sister eavesdropping all he says, he also quits coming or takes the girl out to some place where they can be alone.

And there are other parents who drive all the young people away because they don't like noise, or they want to go to sleep with the birds, and who mortify a girl to death by virtually ordering her friends out of the house.

All of this is a fatal mistake. In every family where there are girls welcome should be printed on the doormat. Girls should be encouraged to have their friends in their own houses instead of entertaining them on the streets. That is not only safer, but it gives the parents a chance to get acquainted with the boys and find out what sort of chaps they are.

For a girl to have a home that her parents make pleasant does as much as any other one thing to promote her chances of making a good marriage, for it is the home atmosphere and the home background that turn a man's thoughts toward matrimony. DOROTHY DIX.

NEW DIVORCE BILL

LONDON, March 2.—(By The Canadian Press)—A new Divorce Bill, based on the majority report of the Divorce Commission, which sat 20 years ago, will be presented to the House of Commons as a private member's Bill. It contains the proposals of Lord Buckmaster's Bill of eight years ago which passed through the House of Lords, but it has been brought up to date by the Divorce Law Reform Union. The bill seeks to establish the following grounds for divorce, for either husband or wife: Adultery; desertion for three years; cruelty; incurable insanity (when the respondent has been a certified lunatic for five years); incurable drunkenness, when the respondent has for three years been separated from the petitioner; imprisonment under a committed death sentence. New grounds for nullity are introduced. They include: Wilful refusal to consummate the marriage; mental unsoundness which has become definite within six months of marriage; recurrent fits of insanity or epilepsy; and certain diseases at the time of marriage.

Dear Miss Dix—My mother died a number of years ago from T. B. I am engaged to be married and not long ago in speaking of disease my fiancé expressed great horror of T. B. I am strong and healthy and working every day, but I am wondering if this young man would marry me if he knew that my mother died of that ailment. Do you think I should tell him? A. B. If he is at all upset by finding out about your mother, get him to go to some physician and talk it over. Any doctor will tell him that T.
