## THE CAPITAL OF THE WEST

Wightman of Alberton or by the pastor Rev. N. McLaughlin. The large choir of the church, led by Jesse Wright, will provide special music for each service.

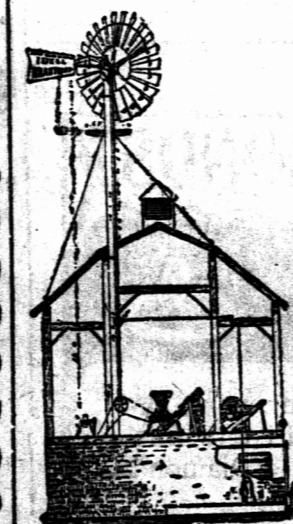

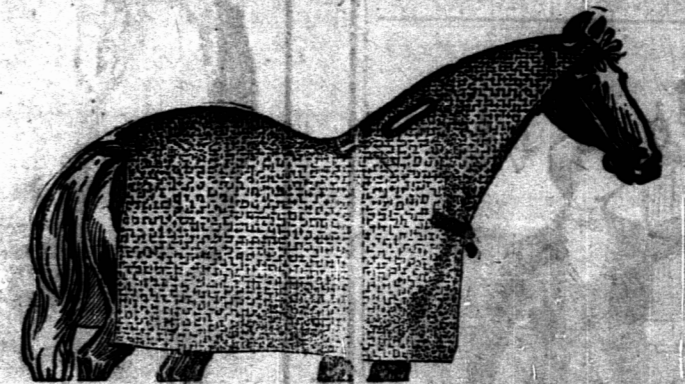
