MRS. JOHN WM. FORSYTH

As the evening shadows gathered on July 2nd, 1947, Mrs. J. W. Forsyth, a deeply loved and highly respected citizen of Alberton, passed to her eternal rest after a very brief illness, in spite of all that medical care and skillful nursing could do.

Geo. H. Cunningham of the Presbyterian Church, assisted by Rev. J. M. Fraser and Rev. Ira MacDonald.

HIGH SCHOOLS TO OFFER COURSES IN DRIVING

Some states in the United States hope soon to undertake a driver training programme in conjunction with high school studies. Through co-operating automobile dealers dual-control cars will be made available on loans as soon as the schools can provide qualified instructors and approved courses. It is hoped that these driving courses will give all students a thorough grounding in the rules of the road and, therefore, reduce accidents. 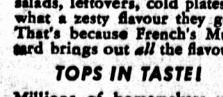

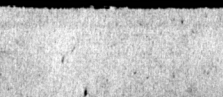

TWO BABIES BORN IN BARGAIN BUSH

BENONI, South Africa, Aug. 11—(CP)—While 10,000 women clawed and fought each other at a cut-price sale, two women gave birth to babies, a man was thrown through a plate glass window and police reserves were rushed to restore order.

The women started queuing before dawn and by eight o'clock about 6,000 had gathered before the store.

Free fights ensued between Europeans and non-Europeans and four policemen who had been detailed for duty there failed to quell the mad rush which started when the doors opened.

Early in the morning, during the excitement, while about 4,000 women were trying to approach the store, two women gave birth to babies.

A man was attacked by a native when he tried to push past and was thrown through a window into the store. The police arrested one man and the injured man was removed to hospital.

Women started fighting each other for possession of goods and eight women fainted during the morning.

ALBERTA FIXES SPEED LIMITS The Alberta provincial government brought into effect on July 1st an order which establishes

maximum speed rates for all vehicles. Prior to that date the rate of speed was based on reasonable conditions prevailing at the time. This meant that a speed of sixty or seventy miles an hour might have been within the law under certain conditions. Under the new order, the maximum rate for passenger cars and buses has been set at fifty miles-per-hour. The provincial authorities are of the opinion that these maximum rates

will reduce the number of highway traffic accidents in the province.
