An inquest will be held Monday. Driver McKay was a native of Stellarton, N. S., and 68 years of age being one of the oldest and most reliable men in that branch of the service.

He was a fireman on the N. S. Railway but came to Moncton in 1875 as locomotive driver on the Northern Division of the Intercolonial during its construction.

Later he ran between Moncton and Campbellton but the last 25 years he has been pulling the C. P. R. and midnight express between St. John and Moncton.

He is survived by one son on the C. P. R. and two daughters, one of whom is Mrs. Purdy of St. John.

PROBING BANK MUDDLE ST. STEPHEN, Mar. 5.—The hearing into the earnings of Julius T. Whitlock, former cashier of the defunct St. Stephen Bank, charged with making false returns to the Government, was begun here yesterday.

Geoffrey G. Rowbotham, chartered accountant, the first witness, gave detailed statements of the condition of affairs of the St. Stephen's Bank, as he found them, showing of what the assets consisted of Gold King and Gold Princes stock and bonds were included among the collateral securities. Notes and drafts that proved to be worthless were also included. In many cases these notes had been renewed from year to year, without payments. Overdrafts of long standing, were also included. Summing up, he testified that the had assets aggregated \$362,699.57.

The capital stock and other assets, stated in the return, amounted to \$268,126.85. Notes to the amount of \$10,000 and an overdraft of \$19,000 were being carried by the bank, at the time of the suspension for the St. Croix Jewelry Co., of which J. T. Whitlock was personally a member.

E. I. Kenen who did business here for some years had an unpaid account of over \$50,000 which the curator was obliged to write off. The bank also carried many other accounts that proved worthless, but all these had been entered in the bank's returns as par-value.

Frank Todd, former president of the bank, testified that he signed monthly statements of the bank, but did not have much knowledge of what was going on, as he trusted everything to Whitlock, who was manager. Since the failure he had advanced \$175,000 with the understanding that he should be left alone.

SAYS RATE WAR WOULD BE RUINOUS NEW YORK, March 5.—It would be unsafe for the Trans-Atlantic steamship companies to do business without a rate agreement, is the opinion of Herman Winter, manager of the Cunard Line, who testified today in the Government's dissolution suit against the so-called steamship trust.

"Every rate war," Mr. Winter said, "has tended to bring all the steamship companies closer together. The entire service has been greatly improved through the stable rate. Entirely unrestricted competition among the Trans-Atlantic lines would result in the ruination of the smaller and weaker companies, and discourage the formation of new companies."
