Big Offer From London For Fight

TEX RICKARD OFFERED \$750,000 FOR CARPENTIER AND DEMPSEY TO FIGHT IN LONDON OLYMPIA

NEW YORK, March 3.—Tex Rickard, promoter of the Dempsey-Carpentier heavyweight championship contest, announced tonight receipt of a \$750,000 offer for the bout from London. The offer, in cable form, was signed by George McDonald of the London Olympia Rickard, who has until the end of the month to select a site for the contest, announced that he would give the proposition due consideration.

CROPS WORTH MILLIONS

The cereal crops of the United States were worth over \$7,000,000,000 to the farmers who raised them in 1918. The product of these crops, all together, was a little under the total for 1917, but, while the prices of some of the cereals were lower in 1918 than in 1917, the prices of others were sufficiently higher to make the total value of the cereals greater in 1918 by more than a quarter of a billion dollars.

BONUS FOR SOLDIERS IN U. S.

With the tax provisions eliminated, the soldiers' bonus bill was reported to the Senate by the finance committee. The cash bonus would be payable January 1. The question of taxes to meet the cost of the bill was left for the next Congress. Aside from striking out the tax provision the committee made little change in the House bill, retaining the five options of a cash bonus based on length of service, deferred certificates farm and home aid and vocational training.

GERMANY IS SHAMMING

Under the caption "Shamming Dead," the Daily Mail began a series of articles based on enquiries by a number of special investigations extending over some months, purporting to show that Germany intends to evade reparations by trickery. The Mail declares that the German industrial machine is being deliberately kept at low speed for the purpose of impressing the world with the precariousness of its financial situation and asserts

that German industries have progressed immensely, thanks to cheap wages and long hours.

Until a calf is one year old, the ration should be of good quality hay, roots and meal, rather than the bulky; that is containing too much silage or corn fodder. A small amount of silage may be fed the first winter, say six or seven pounds a day, at most, to add variety to the ration. Clover or alfalfa should form the bulk of the ration and the grain ration need not be large, but should consist largely of bean, oats and linseed meal, all of which are suitable for young and growing animals.

The heifer's feed should be plentiful and bulky in order to develop a large and efficient digestive track. Silage may be fed liberally; oat straw and a moderate amount of hay and roots will give good growth and development. It due to calves in the spring she should have two or three pounds of grain added to her daily ration. In case the bulky part of the ration is not of extra good quality, a little

Farmers rely too much on rough age in feeding their cattle, said a recent correspondent. He is a feeder with a reputation, and ought to know. This year especially there is no need to skimp the rations. The milk flow of the cows should be maintained, at least as high as demand makes it economical; a good finish should be put on the steers and the young stock should be kept growing. If calves are allowed to go back, they will never make as good animals as they would otherwise. Young two-year-olds, which are to be finished on grass next summer, should not be allowed to lose the thrifty condition they had when they went into the stable. Better feeding, in general, is a thing more farmers should practice.
