THERE is considerable talk among St. John dealers as well as consumers with regard to the action of the three largest Manitoba millers in maintaining the price of flour, notwithstanding the fact that the Ontario millers dropped prices. In July Ontario flour was selling at from \$5.65 to \$5.75, in jobbing lots, and from that time prices steadily declined until they had practically dropped 75c. a barrel. The Manitoba millers, it is alleged, formed some kind of combination and kept up prices until early in September, thus making the consumer pay from 40c. to 50c. higher per barrel. It is also said that quite a number of wholesale buyers refused to buy until prices declined in sympathy with the Ontario products.

While some of our farmers are well advanced, others didn't commence till the 20th.—Our fishermen haven't done much the last week but are still hanging to it.—Some thirty Nova Scotia vessels large and small are lying off here every fine day and night from Basin Head westward gathering in the harvest of the sea. Bait is scarce, as but few squid have yet been taken, but some herring are netted. Some large Nova Scotia trawlers are trawling codfish on the north side some miles off.—A new departure in fishing is made at Bayfield where John Ryan with his usual enterprise has started canning dog fish. Louis Stewart is his foreman. By present indications there will be no scarcity of the raw material, as they catch them there at present by the boat load with gaffs. It will certainly become the duty of the Government to bonus this new industry. Unless some means can be found to lessen their numbers the valuable fisheries of the whole North Atlantic are threatened with extinction.—Mrs. Simon McNeil and son of Cardigan are visiting friends east.—Congratulations to Maynard and Mrs. Fraser—a son, Alexander Fraser and Henry Stewart are fishing cod-fish.

ODDFELLOWS AND LIQUOR TRAFFIC.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Sept. 19—Chief interest in today's session of the Oddfellows' convention centred upon the question of the liquor traffic as being a bar to membership. The report, which was read by Representative Gordon, and later approved by the body in session, decided in brief, that no one can remain a member of a lodge who is engaged in the liquor business in any way, unless he were so engaged, and has been continually since the first ruling was made at the 1895 convention at Atlantic City.

The case which raised the question at this time was of a man who, while engaged in the liquor business, became a member of a lodge. The adopted report decided that "His membership must be recognized until terminated in a manner provided by law. It is the duty of the subordinate lodge to terminate his membership, unless the brother has since retired or shall retire from his business in question, and thus have removed the constitutional prohibition, or shall voluntarily resign his membership."

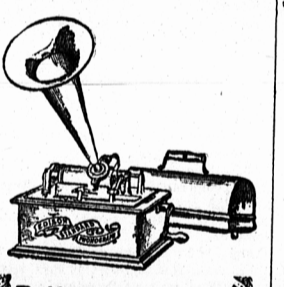
