### ST DUNSTAN'S SPORTS

**Athletes Struggle for Supremacy With Great Determination Winners in the Different Events—Large Crowds in Attendance—Great Day's Sport.**

The Crescent sports are over. They went without a hitch, an unqualified success. Shortly after 1 o'clock the first event was called and at 5.30 all was ended. For this promptness in calling off the races the Crescent and the officers of the track are to be specially commended. Every event was extremely interesting, and every spectator delighted. Seldom indeed has such a good afternoon's sport been seen on a bicycle track in this province. Several of the racers covered themselves with glory. The handicap races are certainly what is required to keep the contestants from loafing. The attendance was large, points east and west being well represented. The Halifax boys did not arrive being probably detained by the weather. But the day and the track were alike perfect.

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### ONE MILE NOVICE.

The novice race was first called. The starters in the first heat were East, Wood, W.F. Collins, L.F. Muncey, Davies, Arbing, C.M. Clarke, A.W. Gaudet. The heat was close throughout. Clarke came in first, Collins second, Gaudet third. Time 2.41. There was scarcely a foot between Gaudet, Muncey and Arbing for third place. In the second heat Louis Large, Frank Compton, Eugene Brown, and G.T. Morris lined up. Compton gained the heat, Large second and Morris third. Time 2.47-4.

In the final heat Clarke, Collins, Compton, Gaudet, Morrison and Large fought to a finish. The last round was an exciting one. Clarke winning first place, Gaudet second and Compton third. Time 2.44.

1st prize—silver cup, (G.H. Taylor); 2nd prize—bicycle pants and stockings, (Gordon & McLellan); 3rd prize—bicycle boots, (Goff Bros.); 4th prize—bicycle stockings, (W.A. Weeks & Co.)

### ONE MILE (Boys under 16)

Byron Brown was an easy winner. Willie Joy second, Will o Brown third, Jimmy Williams, the fourth starter, fell behind and withdrew at the half. Time three minutes. 1st prize, silver medal, (A.N. Large); 2nd prize, silver ink stand (E.W. Taylor); 3rd prize, sweater, (S.A. McDonald).

### 100 YARDS DASH (handicap).

C.J. MacMillan started scratch. H.W. Ritchie one yard handicap, J.W. Heseltine, Cornwall, three yds, A.C. Sinclair, Summerside, three, Jack Payne six, Payne, Ritchie and MacMillan came in in the order named. Time: 11 seconds. 1st prize, marble clock, (Bruce Stewart & C.); 2nd prize, silver medal, (Art Saunders); 3rd prize, Box cigars, (Dodd's Medical Hall).

### QUARTER MILE BICYCLE (handicap)

In the first heat Keith, scratch, was absent. Fenton Newsome and W.C. Cooke started with five yards handicap, D. Arbing, Summerside, and Reg Stewart had 10 yards, G.T. Morris and W.F. Collins 15 yards. Newsome gained on the others from start to finish winning first place, Stewart second and Cook third. Time: 35.25.

In the second heat Unsworth was scratch. J.W. Grant, New Glasgow, N.S., and C.M. Clark five yards handicap. Byron Brown, Louis Large 10 yards, L. Peardon 15 yards. Brown was the heat, Unsworth second and Grant third. Time 36.35.

When the final heat was rung for Unsworth was again scratch. Newsome, Cook and Grant five yards handicap, Byron Brown and Reg Stewart ten yards. The real fight was between Stewart, Newsome and Unsworth whose rivalry kept excitement at fever heat from start to finish. Down the home stretch it was a handsome struggle. Newsome came in ahead, Unsworth second, Stewart third. Time 34.15. 1st prize, gold medal, (Hewitt and Hyndman); 2nd prize, pair vim tires, (Toronto Tire Co.); 3rd prize, pearl opera glasses, (Myers Bros.).

### 220 YARDS DASH, (handicap).

C.J. MacMillan started scratch. H.W. Ritchie three yards handicap, A.C. Sinclair seven yards. MacMillan won the race with Ritchie second, Heseltine third. Time 24 seconds. 1st prize, silver cup, (W.W. Wallner); 2nd prize, bronze clock, (Full electric light Co.); 3rd prize, Daily Examiner for one year.

### HALF MILE BICYCLE, (handicap)

The starters were Unsworth, scratch, Clark and Grant ten yards, 33arp and Compton fourteen yards. Stewart and Arbing twenty yds. Peardon and Collins thirty yds. Unfortunately Unsworth fell on the back stretch second lap. Clarke won the race and great applause. Grant second and Sharp third. Time: 1.12.25. 1st prize, gold medal, (M. Wright & Co.); 2nd prize, silver medal, (John McLennan & Co.); 3rd prize, bicycle boots, (Goff & Co.)

### ONE MILE BICYCLE (2.50 Class)

The starters in the first heat were Byron Brown, G.T. Morris and W.F. Collins. Morris led the lead and at the half was in turn passed by Brown. They kept an even pace until on the home stretch when Collins shot a head followed closely by both Brown and Morris who came in respectively second and third. Time 3.05.

### In the second heat Compton, Newsome, Sharp, Arbing, Peardon and Large, held positions in the order

named. Newsome was an easy winner Arbing second, and Sharp third. Time: 3.01.45.

The six winners afterwards rode the final heat. For the first three quarters it was evidently a test of which could go slowest. But on the fourth round Newsome, Arbing and Sharp had a "sharp" struggle, Newsome winning by a good lead. Sharp second and Arbing third. Time: 3.25.4. 1st prize, silver cup, (Hot Quads); 2nd prize, silver medal, (Jos Merry); 3rd prize, bicycle lamp, (Miller Bros.).

### HALF MILE FLAT RACE (handicap)

D.A. McKinnon, Ham, Bethune and F.J. Bayfield, were the starters. Bethune and Bayfield having 15 yards handicap on McKinnon. But "Dannie" was equal to the occasion and in a twinkling was at his contestants' heels and took the lead on the back stretch. He widened this lead until at the finish he was 30 yards ahead, Bayfield second and Bethune third. Time: 3.10. 1st prize, gold headed cane, (Owen Trainor); 2nd prize, silver medal, (Reardon Bros.); 3rd prize, cased pipe, (Islander Pub. Co.)

### ONE MILE BICYCLE (handicap)

The scratch men did not start. C.M. Clark and J.W. Grant were given 20 yds from scratch; Stewart, Large and Eugene Brown 40 yds; Collins, Gaudet, Morris and Peardon 60 yds; Chas Woods 70 yds. This was a very exciting race from start to finish. On the back stretch last lap, Wood and Collins got a bad loss, the former smashing his front wheel. But the others flew on. Clark won the race with Stewart second and Gaudet third. Time: 2.28. 1st prize, silver cup, (Dan McLeod); 2nd prize, fireproof suit, (Prowse Bros.); 3rd prize, opera glasses, (W.F. Carter).

### ROYAL MILE (Boys under 14)

Ernest McKinnon, Summerside, was an easy and graceful winner. Willie Brown second, Willie Joy third and Ernest McKinnon fourth. Time: 1.28.4. 1st prize, silver medal, (Geo Stanley); 2nd prize, card receiver, (Moore & McLeod); 3rd prize, pearl handled pocket knife, (Fennel & Chandler).

### ONE MILE MASSEY HARRIS.

Great interest was centred in this event, which though slow was an exciting one. Unsworth and Newsome set the pace alternately, and in the last quarter had a handsome race. Excitement ran high. Down the home stretch they came wheel to wheel at a tremendous rate. Unsworth came in about a foot ahead, Newsome second, Cook third. Grant fourth and Harrison fifth. Time: 3.20. 1st prize, gold medal, (Massey & Co. St. John); 2nd prize, silver cup, (Charlottetown Gas Co.); 3rd prize, silver spoon, (D.M. Robinson).

### QUARTER MILE FOOT-RACE (handicap)

C.J. MacMillan started scratch, H.W. Ritchie seven yds handicap, H. Bethune and F.J. Bayfield 10 yds. Cyrus was quickly at his rival's heels and won a handsome race by about 10 yds, Bayfield second and Bethune third. Time: 55 seconds. 1st prize, marble clock, (G.F. Hutcheson); 2nd prize, dressing case, (A.W. Reddin); 3rd prize, cased pipe, (Watson's Drug Store).

### TWO MILE LAP RACE.

The starters were Unsworth, Cook and Stewart. The race was hotly contested. Unsworth made 21 points and won the race; Cooke 17 points and Stewart 11 points. Time: 6.12.4.

### In addition to this Cooke won the time prize for coming in ahead on the last lap.

1st prize, gold medal, (Dodd & Rogers); 2nd prize, silver medal, (Old Sport); 3rd prize, silver mounted cane, (Johnson & Johnson); 4th prize, collar and cuff case, (Hazard & Moore).

### THREE MILE TEAM RACE.

As far as a pretty race was concerned this was the gem of the afternoon. The three best men from the three best clubs on P.E. Island lined up. The race was open to any club in the maritime provinces but the other prizes were not represented. The prize was a handsome trophy valued at \$60 offered by the Crescent Cycling Club, to become the property of the Club winning it three times in succession. The Crescent Club was represented by Clarke, Newsome and Stewart. The Abegweits by Unsworth, Cook and Gaudet and the Summerside Club by Compton, Sharp and Arbing. Each team had of course its admirers and the interest from their appearance on the track until the race was finished never waned. The nine wheels in procession, each manned by a good rider going at a fast clip, was as handsome a sight as could be desired by lovers of the sport.

The race was awarded by points, the first man making nine points, the second eight, etc. The total number of points was thus 45. Each team did some clever manœuvring as the result depended largely on good management. Several attempts were made at pocketing, but each attempt was foiled by the skill of the racers. Eventually Clark and Newsome, both of whom had kept together and maintained favorable positions for a spur, shot quickly to the front, followed at a tremendous clip by the other flyers. But they had the head and kept it to the finish thus making between them 17 points, Stewart, supplementing these with three points, making a total of 20 for the Crescents. Unsworth and Gaudet made between them 13 and

Cook two, a total of 15 points for the Abegweits, and the Summerside team 10 points.—Time 9.08.2-5. Clark beat the three mile record for the track.

### FIVE MILE HANDICAP.

There were only four starters in the five mile race. Grant of New Glasgow was nearest to scratch, having 100 yds handicap, Pictou C. Brown 200 yds, A.W. Gaudet and L.F. Muncey 250 yds. Before the race was ended Muncey withdrew. The race was a fine one and the finish the most exciting of the afternoon. Brown soon overtook Muncey and Gaudet, and the three Charlottetown boys worked together admirably. Each one set the pace in turn hoping that Grant, who was 150 yds behind and alone could not maintain the clip. But notwithstanding their combination work Grant battled it bravely alone, gaining steadily on the advance guard. During the last three laps the excitement was intense, for Grant was now within 20 yards and still lessening the distance until on the last lap all three were lunched, each dashing forward at a headlong clip. The grand stand was a seething mass of excitement, the applause was deafening, and over the heads of the occupants waved a promiscuous variety of hats, handkerchiefs and sun shades. There was no time for speculation as to the result for the three shot over the decisive mark. Brown first, Gaudet second, Grant third, with scarcely a yard between them.

To say that Grant is a star five mile rider is not to detract in the least from the handsome victory of his opponents. He was carried from the field by the Charlottetown boys who are never slow to appreciate merit in any sphere.

## A BATTLE IS RAGING

### Sea and Land Attack On Santiago.

### VESUVIUS THROWING

**Dynamite with Terrible Effect—Spanish Ships and Forts Answer Shot for Shot—Depend on Anglo-American Alliance.**

WASHINGTON, July 1.—(Special.)—Chauncey Depew was welcomed home from Europe at the Republican Club. He said England had held back Germany, Russia, Italy and Austria from interfering in the war and strongly advocated an Anglo-American alliance.

He spoke of the colonial possession desire, saying that the people of the same intellect and blood are in hearty accord with us in this crisis for civilization and humanity.

BALTIMORE, July 1.—(Special.)—Cardinal Gibbons had an interview with President McKinley urging the appointment of more Catholic chaplains in the army and says it will result satisfactorily.

CAMP SEVELLA, Cuba, July 1.—(Special.)—The battle on land against Santiago began this morning. Sampson's fleet was also hotly engaged. It is believed it will be continued till the city capitulates.

The Spanish are shelling the Americans as they advance. Four ships bombarded Manzanilla on Thursday, doing much damage. The Spanish gunboats replied.

The Americans used a balloon on Thursday and were able to reconnoitre the country round and about Santiago. The American troops are supported by 4,000 Cubans.

The Vesuvius used her dynamite guns with terrible effect. General Lawlor's division made advances. New York, July 1.—(Special.)—General Brooke at Chateaufort has been selected to conduct the campaign against Porto Rico. He will move in a week or ten days. It is believed the Porto Ricans will join the Spaniards in resisting the American attack.

LONDON, July 1.—(Special.)—News from Manila shows the conditions unchanged. There are four British warships there. The British commander at Hong Kong has been ordered to send more when he considers it necessary.

The Spanish commander proposed to hand the city over to a protectorate of powers and consulted the German admiral who declined, in view of America's blockade.

The peace party is growing in Spain but Senor Sagasta says the government

cannot act now, and that it will depend on developments. Admiral Canara has not yet gone through the Suez Canal.

There is a reported coldness between Cervera and Blanco. Spain is being urged to fortify points on the Morocco coast.

### Frozen Oysters in London.

LONDON June 29.—The Daily Mail says: The oyster lover will no longer have to spell the months to see whether there is an "r" in them before he dare venture on his favorite indulgence. We are to have a supply of oysters all the year round. The latest development of the British empire is a colonial oyster industry. New Zealand is sending 5,000 dozen frozen oysters, of native production, as an experiment. Mr. George Tabor, of Lower Thames street, is hourly expecting their arrival. It is three years since a New Zealand merchant, on a visit to London, sought unsuccessfully for an oyster. What, no oysters? he exclaimed, after the fashion of the lady who married the butcher. "We must send you some from New Zealand." The idea has at last become a fact. In a day or two London will be invited to try a new specimen of colonial produce.

They are for cooking purposes, soups, sauces, stews, patties and the like. It is not expected that anyone will eat frozen oysters on the half-shell. At present the summer oysters come principally from Portugal and France, and are laid on English beds. The oysters from New Zealand will be kept in refrigerators. They are said to be fine and white and plump. As a trial, some were frozen and cooked in New Zealand. The report was favorable. The first cargo will be put on the London market at 8s a hundred. It is intended to send consignments once a month, until the months arrive spelled with an "r." The oysters are frozen in blocks of eight and fifteen dozen.
